WEDNESDAY JUNE 19, 2013, RENO, NEVADA, 9:00 A.M. 1 2. -000-(This meeting is held concurrently in Reno and Las 3 Vegas via video conferencing.) 4 5 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Ladies and gentlemen, shall we get started? I'll call this meeting to order of the Nevada State 6 7 Dairy Commission, in the month of July. Mr. Hettrick, would you open us up? 8 MR. HETTRICK: Yes, sir, Mr. Chairman. 9 10 This is the time and place set for the regularly scheduled meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission for the 11 12 month of June, 2013. Are you hearing us? 13 COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: No. 14 MR. HETTRICK: I'm going to pause for a moment. 15 you hear us now? 16 COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: That's better. 17 MR. HETTRICK: All right. I can try to talk louder if 18 it helps. 19 COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: When you turn your head down 20 toward the paper, we cannot hear you. 21 MR. HETTRICK: All right. I'll turn this way a little 22 bit. Let me continue then. This meeting has been scheduled and noticed in compliance with pertinent statutes, including the open 23 24 meeting law. 25 A copy of the agenda has been handed to the court

reporter, with the request that it be a part of the official 1 2. transcript of these proceedings. My name is Lynn Hettrick, Executive Director of the 3 Nevada State Dairy Commission. 4 5 Present today are Mr. Troy G. Crowther, member of the commission. Mr. John Collier, member of the commission, 6 7 Mr. Warren Goedert, counsel for the state commission, and members of the Dairy Commission staff. 8 Those who present statements or evidence to the 9 10 commission during this meeting are requested to first be acknowledged by the chairman, and to identify themselves for the 11 12 record. 13 And for the record, I will comment that the chairman, 14 Mr. Cook, is on vacation this month, and that's why he is not in 15 attendance today. 16 The first thing on the agenda, Mr. Chairman, is public 17 comment. 18 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Are there any public comments 19 from anyone? Anyone want to discuss any matters pertaining to 20 the dairy industry in the great state of Nevada? 21 Anybody here want to say anything? 22 Everybody is silent. 23 Anybody there in Las Vegas want to say anything? 24 MR. HETTRICK: Quiet group. 25 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: I guess not. We will move

1 forward. 2. Second thing, Mr. Chairman, is the approval, or possible action, is the approval of the minutes for May 15, 2013, 3 and there are minor corrections which I will hand to the court 4 5 reporter. And with that, Mr. Chairman, you could take a motion to approve the minutes for May. 6 7 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Would you like to make the motion? 8 9 COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Sure. I'll make a motion to 10 approve the minutes from May 15th, 2013, Nevada State Dairy Commission meeting. 11 12 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: And I'll second those. 13 motion. 14 COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: With the indicated changes. COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Very good. I'll second that. 15 16 MR. HETTRICK: All right. Then obviously the motion 17 carries, as we have two positives and no negative votes. 18 Next on the agenda, Mr. Chairman is the staff report. 19 Our balance carry forward at the end of May was 20 424,408.65, that's an increase of 16,591.63 from the end of April. And we anticipate that the next two months will generate 21 22 increases in the reserves. 23 The milk price report has been printed and handed out. 24 The merger with the Nevada Department of Agriculture is complete, 25 signed by the governor, and actually well under way.

We have been told that these offices, the Northern 1 2. Nevada offices, will move into the Department of Agriculture no later than July 8 of 2013. So, we have about three weeks left at 3 most in this facility. 4 5 It's actually likely that that move will occur before that. 6 7 The, we are essentially hinged on moving our server, and the server is housed in this building. It's going to be 8 moved to the EATS, which is the information technology division 9 10 for the Department of Administration. And that once that move is made, we will all end up 11 12 moving, because they are going the change the addresses the way 13 you hit that server to do our work, and so everyone will move at that time. 14 We have a state agency, Division of Child and Family 15 16 Services, who has come in here and toured our facility here, and 17 it appears that they have negotiated a lease to take over 18 approximately two thirds of the space we presently occupy. 19 a longer term lease than the remainder of ours, so it's a good 20 thing for the landlord. 21 We don't know yet for sure. The exchange of e-mails I 22 have seen says that we continue to pay our remainder on the, what we have. But, we are negotiating to either buy that out or see 23 if we can work out a way to get out of the lease for the 24 25 remainder of the two years, the thousand feet that would remain

1 here that we wouldn't be occupying. 2. So, we're trying to do that. Best-case scenario, we get out of the lease all 3 together. Worst-case -- without paying anything. 4 In between 5 would be maybe pay something, or buy out or help with the remodel or whatever. We don't know yet. 6 7 Worst-case is none of that works and we end up paying the lease, which still saves us 66 percent of our lease costs for 8 9 the balance of the term. So, either way it's a good deal. 10 With our move, the next commission meeting will be held in the NDA building, I'm not sure yet how we are going to handle 11 12 that to the south. We are going to move this video conferencing 13 system into the Department of Agriculture. It will be a backup. 14 We have scheduled to use their facility and their video conferencing, when it's available. However, that's a heavily 15 16 used conference room. And in the month of August, we know it's 17 not available. So, we'll be working that out between now and 18 then, and let you know what we're going to do. 19 In July, the problem will be that we will be using 20 their facility, but it won't go to that, to your offices down It may be that you will have to go over to the Department 21 22 of Agriculture office on Macleod to get to that facility until 23 things are finished up, whatever is going happen. 24 So, we don't know that yet. We'll let you know. 25 we'll also be noticing the public that the locations will change.

- 1 It won't change the way we do our agenda postings and stuff,
- 2 we'll put it all into there for the next meeting so everybody
- 3 knows what's going on.
- I think of interest, perhaps, to you just as general
- 5 information, we did a tour with some Chinese folks on Tuesday.
- 6 Yesterday, and went out and -- I'm sorry. On Monday. And went
- 7 out to Yerington, they're looking to buy hay but they're also
- 8 interested in buying powdered milk.
- 9 And I think the biggest point of interest is that there
- 10 is a second company looking to build another powdered milk plant
- 11 in Yerington, taking over the old Western Dairy facility that was
- 12 over there previously that closed down.
- 13 And it's possible, with what they're doing, that that
- 14 plant will reopen as a powder milk plant.
- 15 Seemed to be pretty far along. They had a consultant
- 16 there who was designing the equipment to go into the facility and
- 17 they indicate they have the availability of milk out of
- 18 California, and that they're ready to go into business.
- So, that's interesting, just as a curiosity, we'll see
- 20 where it goes, but I thought, you know, you might all be
- 21 interested in knowing about it.
- 22 We then toured -- the excuse me. I've got a frog
- 23 today. We then toured the DFA plant and actually got to go out
- 24 and walk through it. Really impressive. And huge facility.
- 25 They're very close. They actually anticipate operation by the

- 1 middle of December of this year. And that's really impressive
 2 when you go, it was pointed out as we were standing there, when
- 3 you go into their offices over there and they do these tours,
- 4 they've got pictures of the each month of the progress that they
- 5 have made. And the interesting thing was the first time they put
- 6 equipment on the ground and did anything was August of 2012, and
- 7 they anticipate being in production December of 2013 on an 84
- 8 million dollar plant. You couldn't even get the permits for that
- 9 in any other state in this union, I don't think, in that length
- 10 of time.
- 11 So, it has really been impressive how quickly it's
- 12 gone, and how much cooperation there's been. So, just exciting,
- 13 and obviously good for the dairy industry. And there is a report
- 14 of that 3,000 cow dairy. It will be going into Smith Valley.
- 15 I think it's about 99 percent certain it's going to
- 16 happen. And that one's coming. There's Paladinis bought the, I
- 17 think it's the old Allegri dairy in Fallon, and that's to reopen.
- 18 That's about 1,500 cows as I recall. So, there's at least 4,500
- of the 15,000 cows there that we're looking for, and continuing
- 20 to move forward.
- 21 So, things are looking good. Finally just a comment.
- 22 This will be my last meeting as the executive director of the
- 23 Dairy Commission. The next time you folks meet, I will be in my
- 24 new role -- I got a terrible frog today. And so I won't be, I
- 25 don't think I will be attending meetings.

I may pop in and say hello to everybody, but I don't 1 2. think I will be attending meetings on a regular basis. I don't know that yet. But, I just want to tell everybody how much I 3 have enjoyed doing this and how excited I am for the dairy 4 5 industry and what's going on in the State of Nevada. I think there is a great deal of positive that's 6 7 happening right now, and we've got a lot of good things to look forward to, and I think that applies to agriculture as well. I 8 am excited about the overall synergy of what's going to happen 9 10 when we get all this combined and all these people working together. 11 12 I think there's some real opportunities. I just want 13 to say thanks to everybody, and how much I have enjoyed working 14 with all of you. It's been a pleasure and beyond that, I don't 15 have any more, Mr. Chairman, on the staff report. 16 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Very good, Lynn. Thank you very 17 And thank you for your service. And we wish you well in much. 18 your new assignment with the state. I know that will be a big 19 challenge for you. 20 MR. HETTRICK: I think a big learning curve. I look 21 forward to it. 22 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Big learning curve. Right, right. So, with that, do we have any legal things that are 23 24 pressing against us, Mr. Goedert? 25 MR. GOEDERT: No, not that I know of. Everything seems

- to be fairly quite and well running. And we have made some 1 2. progress with the legislature and the governor. I'm real proud of the fact that the governor vetoed 3 that bill. 4 5 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: For the record, would you say which bill it was that he vetoed? 7 MR. GOEDERT: The milk bill that they were trying to have raw milk available to anyone and everyone. And that was, 8 that took a little bit of intestinal fortitude to do that. So, 9 10 the governor should get a big star on his door for that as well as our staff. 11 12 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Probably a combination of both. 13 MR. GOEDERT: Yep. 14 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Okay. With that, are there any 15 other considerations to come or matters to come before us or to
 - 16 the dairy industry in the State of Nevada?
 - 17 MR. HETTRICK: Unless Dave has any comment.
 - 18 COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: And I just want to thank Lynn
 - 19 as well for the service he's done. He's taken us in a good
 - 20 direction. When he came on board, we were starting to move in a
 - direction toward marketing and trying to promote dairy, in 21
- 22 Nevada, and I think he's done a good job of spearheading that.
- So, we appreciate that. 23
- MR. HETTRICK: Thank you very much. I have to say, and 24
- 25 I'll say it again. I've said it every time I think I have talked

about any of this. The staff here has done great job. 1 2. Been willing to step up, change roles, wear cow suits and go to fairs. And, I mean, it's really been, it's been a 3 group effort, believe me. It's just been fun to be involved with 4 5 it, and see some results. That's the nice thing. 6 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Very good. 7 MR. HETTRICK: Dave wants to. COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Yes, sir. 8 MR. COON: Yes, Dave Coon, for the record. 9 10 express our continued appreciation for the commission and the role that it plays in assisting us within the industry. 11 12 Inasmuch as this is Mr. Hettrick's last meeting, we 13 want to express our gratitude to him. I've met with him several 14 times and expressed concerns about the transition to the Department of Agriculture, and we're thankful for his 15 16 reassurances that things will continue to function and, you know, 17 continue to do the good work that they have been doing for so 18 long within the state. And on behalf of all of us, Lynn, at Anderson Dairy, 19 20 thank you for your service and for your availability all the time 21 to be able to discuss issues and concerns with you. We wish you 22 the very best in your opportunity. 23 So, good luck to you. 24 Thank you. MR. HETTRICK: 25 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Thank you very much.

any other public comment or comments? By anyone? Anybody want 1 2. to say anything? 3 Now, is Ted going to be our new executive director? 4 MR. HETTRICK: You bet. Tom is going to be our 5 executive director. COMMISSIONER COLLIER: I meant Tom. 6 7 MR. HETTRICK: I was going to slip that by, and you didn't have to say anything. They haven't changed the title, but 8 9 Tom will be running the show, yes. 10 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Does he get a raise? 11 MR. HETTRICK: I recommended that, but I haven't seen 12 He gets the work though. He was doing the work before. 13 So, I think he's more than up to it. 14 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Okay. Well, is there anything else to come before the good of the board? 15 16 MR. HETTRICK: No. I think we're done. 17 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Anybody have any other comments 18 from the south? This is probably going to go on record as the 19 shortest meeting ever. And what is it that our chairman always 20 says? He's got a buck bet on this? 21 MR. HETTRICK: Yeah. I think it's a buck on the 22 shortest meetings. I think he's going to have to pay up. COMMISSIONER COLLIER: I'll entertain a motion to 23 adjourn the meeting then. 24 25 COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: I will make a motion to adjourn
