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3 (This meeting is held concurrently in Reno and Las  
4 Vegas via video conferencing.)

5 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Let's convene this August 21st  
6 meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission.

7 Mr. Hettrick, would you begin the formalities, please?

8 MR. HETTRICK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

9 This is the time and place set for the regularly  
10 scheduled meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission for the  
11 month of September, 2012.

12 This meeting has been scheduled and noticed, and in  
13 compliance with the pertinent statutes, including the open  
14 meeting law.

15 A copy of the agenda has been handed to the court  
16 reporter, with the request that it be part of the transcript of  
17 these proceedings.

18 My name is Lynn Hettrick, executive director of the  
19 Nevada State Dairy Commission.

20 Present today are Mr. Christopher Cook, chairman,  
21 Mr. Troy Crowther, member of the commission, Mr. John Collier,  
22 member of the commission, Mr. Warren Goedert, counsel for the  
23 State Dairy Commission, and certain members of the commission  
24 staff.

25 Those who wish to present statements or evidence to the

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1 commission during the meeting are requested to first be  
2 acknowledged by the chairman and to identify themselves for the  
3 record.

4 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. We will proceed with agenda item  
5 number one?

6 MR. HETTRICK: Number one, Mr. Chairman, is public  
7 comment.

8 CHAIRMAN COOK: Anybody want to make a comment from the  
9 public?

10 Seeing none, let's press on to number two.

11 MR. HETTRICK: All right. For possible action, license  
12 applications.

13 Processing distributor license application by Chocolat,  
14 Glendale, Arizona. Robert Lopez, managing member.

15 The applicant seeks a license to distribute ice cream,  
16 (gelato) in the Southern Nevada Marketing Area. Temporary  
17 approval was granted on August 22nd, 2012.

18 The applicant's prices and costs have been reviewed by  
19 members of the dairy commission staff, and are in compliance with  
20 the agency's laws and regulations.

21 The applicant will be responsible for the assessments.

22 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Let me make a correction here,  
23 because I said let's open the August meeting. And I meant  
24 September meeting.

25 Okay. Is there anyone present representing this

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1 applicant?

2 MR. LOPEZ: Yes. My name is Robert Lopez.

3 COMMISSIONERE CROWTHER: Hello. Would you like to come  
4 up here to be closer to the microphone?

5 MR. LOPEZ: Good morning, commissioners. My name is  
6 Robert Lopez.

7 CHAIRMAN COOK: Thank you, Mr. Lopez. We appreciate  
8 you coming to this meeting.

9 Is there anything in the application that needs to be  
10 amended? Is it as you submitted it?

11 MR. LOPEZ: Yes, it is.

12 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Tell us a little bit about your  
13 business.

14 MR. LOPEZ: Sure. The company started in San Diego.  
15 We have been fortunate enough to lease some space up at Palms  
16 Casino.

17 The basis of the business is gelato. Basically a dry  
18 product that comes in, and then we infuse it, if you will, with  
19 milk.

20 And then it is in a frozen batch maker, and the end  
21 result is a variety of different gelatos with various different  
22 syrups that are put in it for the different flavors.

23 So, we make a bulk batch, then put it in the freezer to  
24 get it solid, then it's in serving trays and goes into the  
25 serving counters.

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1                   CHAIRMAN COOK: And that's just the single location at  
2 the Palms?

3                   MR. LOPEZ: That is correct, at this point, single  
4 location.

5                   CHAIRMAN COOK: And the mix comes from where, if you  
6 don't mind me asking.

7                   MR. LOPEZ: The franchisor purchases bulk mix from  
8 Milan Italy, actually.

9                   And it goes through customs, and then he has a  
10 warehouse and stores it in San Diego. He has two units in San  
11 Diego. And we will be their first franchisee.

12                   How we will be getting it is shipping in quantities,  
13 storing it here in an off-site storage facility, and then take  
14 the quantities to the unit there at the Palms.

15                   CHAIRMAN COOK: Do you also have an operation in  
16 Glendale, Arizona?

17                   MR. LOPEZ: My core business is Wendy's Old Fashioned  
18 Hamburgers. And, yes, I have several stores in the Phoenix area.  
19 We also have a store in Henderson, hence the entry to the Las  
20 Vegas business.

21                   CHAIRMAN COOK: Well, let me say thank you to coming to  
22 Nevada to open a business. We appreciate it.

23                   MR. LOPEZ: My pleasure.

24                   CHAIRMAN COOK: I have no questions. Troy, any  
25 questions? John, any questions?

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1           COMMISSIONER COLLIER: No questions.

2           COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: No, no questions.

3           CHAIRMAN COOK: Seeing no further questions, any  
4 questions or comments from the staff or audience?

5           There being none, I will entertain a motion.

6           COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Mr. Chairman, I so move that we  
7 accept this application.

8           COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Second.

9           CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Having a motion and a second.

10          COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: I'm sorry. Do we need to state  
11 that we approve it or accept it?

12          MR. HETTRICK: Either is fine.

13          CHAIRMAN COOK: I don't know. Counselor?

14          MR. GOEDERT: Either is just fine.

15          COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Or does it matter?

16          MR. GOEDERT: It doesn't really matter that much.

17          COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Okay. I will second it.

18          CHAIRMAN COOK: Having a motion and second and no  
19 dissenting votes, the motion carries and the application is  
20 granted.

21          Thank you, Mr. Lopez, we appreciate you coming. Good  
22 luck.

23          MR. LOPEZ: Thank you. We'll need that.

24          MR. HETTRICK: All right. Mr. Chairman, next on the  
25 agenda is a retail store importing out-of-state, Tops N Bottoms

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1 Frozen Yogurt. They are from Las Vegas. The owner is Jeremy  
2 Fullam.

3 The applicant seeks a license to distribute ice cream,  
4 novelties, sherbert and frozen yogurt in the Southern Nevada  
5 Marketing Area. The applicant's prices and costs have been  
6 reviewed by the members of the dairy commission, staff and are in  
7 compliance with this agency's laws and regulations. And the  
8 applicant will be responsible for the assessments.

9 CHAIRMAN COOK: Is there anyone representing this  
10 applicant present?

11 COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: No.

12 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Any comments or questions from  
13 the staff? Anything that they can tell us about this  
14 application?

15 MR. HETTRICK: The only thing I can tell you from the  
16 application that I see, it says they contacted Nevada  
17 distributors to see if the product was available locally.

18 It is a product called Honey Hills Farms prepackaged  
19 frozen yogurt. So, I'm sure Honey Hills Farms is not made in  
20 Nevada, so it must be that they are marketing a specific product.

21 The only single product they're talking about actually  
22 marketing, at this moment, is the Honey Hills Farms frozen  
23 yogurt.

24 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay.

25 All right. Well, there being no further questions, I



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1 will entertain a motion.

2           COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: I will make a motion to approve  
3 the license application for the retail store imported from  
4 out-of-state by Tops N Bottoms Frozen Yogurt, Las Vegas, Nevada,  
5 to distribute ice cream, novelties, sherbert and frozen yogurt in  
6 the Southern Nevada Marketing Area.

7           CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Is there a second?

8           COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Mr. Chairman, I second that  
9 motion.

10          CHAIRMAN COOK: Having a motion and a second and no  
11 dissenting votes, the motion carries, and the license is granted.

12          MR. HETTRICK: Mr. Chairman, next on the agenda is  
13 approval of the minutes for the August 15, 2012 meeting.

14                 We have one minor change which I will submit to the  
15 court reporter. And other than that, the minutes can be approved  
16 as submitted.

17          CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Do we have a motion to approve  
18 the minutes of the last meeting?

19          COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Mr. Chairman, I'll second that.  
20 I mean a first.

21          COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: I'll make a motion to approve  
22 the minutes of the previous -- of the last meeting.

23          COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Then I'll second it.

24          CHAIRMAN COOK: I have motion and two seconds, and no  
25 dissenting votes.

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1           The motion carries to accept the minutes of the last  
2 meeting as corrected.

3           MR. HETTRICK: All right. Next, Mr. Chairman, is the  
4 staff report.

5           Our balance after the report for September, 2012, our  
6 balance forward at the end of August was 459,047.25. That's a  
7 decrease of 22,691.48 from the end of July.

8           You will recall, in the last meeting I told you that we  
9 expected about 20,000 more of the credits issued to come in, and  
10 we see in fact about 22,000.

11           The milk price report has been handed out, printed, and  
12 so you have that.

13           I attended on Friday a conference that was put on by  
14 the University of Nevada, Reno, Extension Service.

15           It was titled changes in the U.S. in the Nevada  
16 Agriculture Affecting Future Growth in Nevada Dairies.

17           It basically was very good information. They said they  
18 think the next couple of years are going to be tough in the dairy  
19 industry, between fuel prices and feed costs with the drought.

20           But, they believe that the long-term outlook for the  
21 dairy industry is quite good, and felt pretty good about that.

22           They did some interesting things, went in and one of --  
23 their crop specialists went, calculated the total amount of tons  
24 of hay required for approximately 33,000 dairy cows, which is  
25 what they estimate is going to take to handle the Model Dairy and

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1 the new dry powder plant. And calculated that we have plenty of  
2 acreage and plenty of alfalfa hay in Nevada to take care of it.

3 If you added a corn silage portion to the ration,  
4 they're looking for significant acreage increases, in corn  
5 silage, which is not produced and can't be hauled very far, not  
6 produced in quantity.

7 It can't be hauled very far because of the weight in  
8 the water. So, they think there are some opportunities for  
9 people maybe to rotate crops and some additional growth in  
10 alfalfa across Nevada, and other places, because you can haul the  
11 alfalfa hay a lot easier and transport it, even if you  
12 transported it from well out into eastern Nevada, it would still  
13 be cheaper than hauling hay to California.

14 So, it makes us very competitive. It should be good  
15 for our market.

16 A lot of talk about the Farm Bill and the new program  
17 that they're proposing, which is insurance. Seems to be some  
18 support. I didn't hear any negatives.

19 The basics of that is it's actually an insurance  
20 program. If you sign up for it, you get four dollar guaranteed  
21 margin paying nothing. You pay nothing for the insurance up to  
22 four dollars of margin.

23 Anything above that, you pay additional premiums for.  
24 It seems like the break even point, they felt, and everybody  
25 looking at it when they showed us was about six to 6.50 percent

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1 margin.

2           You get much above that, the insurance premium cost  
3 gets really high. You get much below that, and it's not worth  
4 it. So, there's kind of a break in there.

5           The feeling was that they think that's going to go  
6 forward sometime. I don't think soon, and I know Tom looked, and  
7 it doesn't look like they are going to make any changes before  
8 the election to what the existing Farm Bill is. They may extend  
9 it.

10           The biggest thing about the insurance program is you  
11 have a choice. You can sign up for it and get a guaranteed  
12 margin and insure more if you want, or you can say no.

13           If you say no, and the price drops, you're free to do  
14 whatever you want.

15           You're not going to get any four dollar payment or six  
16 dollar payment or any other payment guaranteed. You're going to  
17 be out there in the open market. But, you can do anything you  
18 want.

19           If you sign up for the insurance and the price drops  
20 below four, the margin drops below four or six, if that's what  
21 you insure, you must, to collect money, you must cut back on  
22 supply.

23           You will have to get rid of dairy cows. So the thing  
24 is, they're saying it's self controlled. You decide what you  
25 want to do. And you don't have to sign up. But, if you sign up

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1 they are going to try to control the supply side as well as the  
2 margin.

3 And they seem to think that's reasonable. They feel  
4 that it's, you know, okay.

5 So, we'll see. It's got a long way to go. Certainly  
6 isn't passed and it certainly isn't in guaranteed form yet, but  
7 that's the form that it's in right now.

8 CHAIRMAN COOK: How is that going to mesh with the CWT  
9 program?

10 MR. HETTRICK: Well, I think that it will go away. I  
11 think, if you are talking about milk, I think that will go away  
12 and this will be the total replacement, is milk will go away.

13 So, yeah. Again, there's a long ways to go. I think  
14 Tom hit it on the head when they talked over there like it was  
15 going to be very, it was really moving forward.

16 But, when we go and look, after we talked about it a  
17 bit, they said no, it looks like they are just going to extend  
18 what they have for three months and then they will see if they  
19 can do anything.

20 So, I think this is still the big picture overview what  
21 they would like, and I think it's a long ways from what they may  
22 get. We'll see.

23 But, I thought you might be interested in just how  
24 they're doing and what they're doing.

25 The one other thing that I wanted to comment about,

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1 quickly about, is Pete Olsen made a presentation on the plant out  
2 there, and the first time I heard why the plant is really  
3 relatively unique.

4           There are two other plants like it in the world. And I  
5 think they're both in New Zealand and this would be the next one.

6           But, the reason this is unique is when the powdered  
7 milk, when the milk is dried, the whole fat milk is dried, it is,  
8 comes out into a processing stream where instead of being dried  
9 in air that's blown through it and the like, to help dry it and  
10 fluff it and all that, it's dried in pure nitrogen.

11           CHAIRMAN COOK: Huh.

12           MR. HETTRICK: And this eliminates oxygen getting to  
13 the fat that's in the whole milk.

14           And the whole system, from the time they start the  
15 drying, is in a nitrogen atmosphere, including clear through  
16 packaging.

17           So, it's packaged with no oxygen in it. Where the fat  
18 in whole dried milk would normally go rancid within six months  
19 because of the oxygen, this apparently has a shelf life of two  
20 years.

21           So, this is making it very easy for them to go in to  
22 under developed regions, particularly in China where they have  
23 less electricity, no refrigeration, those kinds of things, and  
24 it's virtually a guaranteed market.

25           It's going to take a long time to get electricity in a

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1 lot of these places. And they don't have shipping capability.  
2 And, of course, the cost of freight is way less. You  
3 reconstitute it in the end.

4 Then they said they were actually going to put it in  
5 these little juice boxes that you've all seen, that you buy the  
6 little foil in the top when you stick the straw in when they  
7 reconstitute, and apparently when it goes into that, it's still  
8 good for six more months and it doesn't take refrigeration.

9 They feel like they've got a leg up on the market for  
10 under developed countries into the future, until they catch up,  
11 they think this is a big plus.

12 So -- and they can do a whole lot of other things with  
13 it as well. And they can, can adjust the percentages of fat and  
14 all the things they want to do. They think they will market some  
15 cream out of there and the like.

16 But, very interesting. Their construction is full  
17 under way, they're driving about ten to 15 pilings a day. And as  
18 soon as that's done, they expect, and that's supposed to be ten  
19 days, they expect a full construction crew to be out there  
20 working, a company out of Utah, doing the work.

21 So, very interesting. Fun conference to attend just in  
22 general.

23 Unfortunately, too small and two dairymen. All the  
24 rest were government folks.

25 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Typical. Is there any plans for

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1 cheese?

2 MR. HETTRICK: Not at that plant, no. Might be a  
3 future for some cheese, but no plants right now.

4 CHAIRMAN COOK: Are they going to do the packaging down  
5 to the juice box level?

6 MR. HETTRICK: No, they are going to be shipping bulk,  
7 and they will be reconstituted in the juice packages on the other  
8 end is the way I got it. They're going to be in bulk.

9 CHAIRMAN COOK: Now, are they getting any new dairymen  
10 out there to step you and sign those quotas?

11 MR. HETTRICK: I'm glad you asked that question.  
12 That's a good one.

13 Pete Olsen, who is the DFA board member for the region,  
14 and represents our guys in the region, said that they anticipate  
15 right now at least 25 percent increase in cow numbers from the  
16 existing dairies. At least.

17 They think there is one dairy that has been closed that  
18 is going to reopen. Apparently they are aware of negotiations to  
19 reopen one of the dairies.

20 Whether it will be new people or, you know, people  
21 coming, I have no idea.

22 But he indicated there was at least one dairy that they  
23 anticipated reopening, and he said that they had multiple  
24 inquiries for people interested in coming here. And he's  
25 reiterated the same thing that we have talked about in the past.



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1           Apparently multiple dairies in California, who would  
2 move in a minute if they could sell their facilities and walk  
3 away with, not owing money, or a little money in hand, they would  
4 move. But they can't do it.

5           And as of right now, it's, you know, they're just  
6 waiting.

7           They're behind because of the first contractor quit  
8 after 90 days.

9           They anticipate now that they will open fall of 2013,  
10 and they say they're sold out the day they open. They could sell  
11 every single pound right up to capacity.

12           So, very good overall picture for us on what we have  
13 right now.

14           I told Tom the only negative I heard in the whole thing  
15 was, we had an NDEP guy there saying, so what are they going to  
16 do with the manure?

17           And immediately, you know, well, it's a four to six  
18 food water table, and what are they going to do with the manure?

19           And, you know, so there's a lot of talk about how we  
20 are going to dispose of the waste that has to be taken care of.

21           CHAIRMAN COOK: Ship it to Carson City.

22           MR. HETTRICK: We should park some at NDEP.

23           MR. GOEDERT: They produce all of their own.

24           MR. HETTRICK: Anyway, that's a concern, obviously, and  
25 it's going to have to be addressed.

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1           But, our regulations and rules are a lot more  
2 reasonable than other states. So, it can be done. It's not  
3 going to be cheap, and they are going to have to make sure that,  
4 you know, the system flows the dollars around where it has to to  
5 make it work.

6           And ultimately they are going to make it work.

7           COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Is there anybody in the, the  
8 marketplace that processes the manure for fertilizer for home  
9 use, like Bandini does over in California?

10          MR. HETTRICK: They received a call from somebody out  
11 of San Diego who said he wants to come up here and buy it all and  
12 process it and make it into a commercial fertilizer.

13          But, they don't have that guy in hand, and they don't  
14 know what his process is or how he intends to do it, or where he  
15 intends to market it.

16          But, they did get the phone call that some guy out of  
17 San Diego, and they had gotten it that day, and they hadn't  
18 spoken to him.

19          They just got a phone message that said I understand  
20 you are putting in a plant; I understand construction is under  
21 way. I want to talk to you because I process this stuff and make  
22 it into commercial grade fertilizer and I'm interested in coming  
23 to Nevada. And they were going to call him later that day.

24          MR. GOEDERT: Do you need fertilizer?

25          COMMISSIONER COLLIER: No, Warren, I have plenty of

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1 aged fertilizer. 25-year-old fertilizer.

2 MR. GOEDERT: I was trying to pawn some off on you.

3 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: And it grows daily. My pile  
4 grows daily.

5 MR. GOEDERT: You know where it comes from.

6 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: We have seven garbage cans that  
7 we get rid of it.

8 MR. GOEDERT: Oh, really?

9 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Yeah. We have so much of it.

10 MR. GOEDERT: We have got a whole bunch of it out at  
11 the ranch too. It's about six feet high and 20 feet wide.

12 COMMISSIONER COLLIER: Maybe we ought to go into  
13 fertilization.

14 CHAIRMAN COOK: Has anybody broached the subject of a  
15 digester?

16 MR. HETRICK: They talked about digesters. The  
17 comments generally, they were expensive and kind of new  
18 technology that they're not real comfortable with, and they, I  
19 think they acknowledge that there are some that have been working  
20 and doing reasonably well.

21 But, expense a big issue right now, still, with them  
22 not, they're not positive what the price is going to be, and it's  
23 obviously it's going to be based on the international market.  
24 It's not going to be based on saying Class IV, Nevada. It's  
25 going to be an international market to make them competitive no

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1 matter what.

2           So, I think there's a hang up there, and they feel  
3 like, again, the bio digesters beyond being new technology and  
4 expensive, they realize they're out there, and might be a way to  
5 get rid of it.

6           CHAIRMAN COOK: It would almost seem to me like it  
7 might be something that the plant could offer.

8           MR. HETTRICK: I think their options, I don't think  
9 they want to haul manure very far. So, I think they'll, you  
10 know, they'll -- I don't know whether -- again, I am not certain,  
11 I'm not familiar enough with bio digesters.

12           I don't know whether small scale at individual dairies  
13 works, or a bigger one somewhere works better.

14           I know when we were talking with the yogurt folks, they  
15 were talking about the fact, that the way you combined it with  
16 the manure, that was worth hauling, because the production of  
17 methane was higher for some reason if you did that.

18           We don't have whey in this situation, so whether or not  
19 there's a single plant capability, I have no idea. I don't know.

20           CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. All right.

21           Well, let's press on.

22           MR. HETTRICK: Okay. Next on the agenda is the legal  
23 report.

24           MR. GOEDERT: I got nothing to report.

25           I mean, we haven't been sued by anybody. We're doing

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1     okay that way.  Have for quite a while, and I just look at that  
2     as a good thing.

3             CHAIRMAN COOK:  It means you're doing your job.

4             MR. GOEDERT:  Well, somebody is doing it.

5             CHAIRMAN COOK:  Keeping us out of trouble.

6             Okay.  Next?

7             MR. HETTRICK:  Consideration of other matters relating  
8     to the dairy industry, next on the agenda.

9             CHAIRMAN COOK:  Anything?  Anybody?  Buehler?  Buehler?

10            MR. HETTRICK:  Last on the agenda, Mr. Chairman, public  
11     comment and discussion.

12            COMMISSIONER CROWTHER:  I do.  I'm sorry.  I had  
13     comment.

14            I had a meeting.  Some guys approached me and just  
15     wanted to pick my brain a little bit on, went to lunch.  Some  
16     guys that are, have been approached to do a dairy in Vietnam.

17            Apparently, there is similar to China, there's a  
18     shortage of protein and some real concern over there.

19            And so they offered, this guy had an island over in  
20     Vietnam.  And they have approached him to look at, you know,  
21     building a dairy there.

22            And in very preliminary stages, but, you know , I don't  
23     know if, you know, in this powder plant if China is the only  
24     Asian market they have approached.  Apparently Vietnam has some  
25     pretty significant needs as well.

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1           Just throw it out there. Maybe you could pass that  
2 along to those guys.

3           MR. HETTRICK: Okay. I'll make sure that they find  
4 that out, I can shoot an e-mail to Frances and let him know of  
5 the potential market in Vietnam.

6           CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay.

7           MR. HETTRICK: All right. That's all we have,  
8 Mr. Chairman.

9           CHAIRMAN COOK: Anything else? Anybody have any  
10 comments, questions?

11          COMMISSIONER COLLIER: None here.

12          CHAIRMAN COOK: Seeing none, we will adjourn this  
13 meeting of the September meeting of the Nevada State Dairy  
14 Commission.
