3	COMMISSIONER COOK: Okay. Well, in the absence
4	of our legal counsel, we'll go ahead and convene this
5	January meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission.
6	Mr. Hettrick, would you open the meeting
7	formally, please.
8	MR. HETTRICK: Yes, sir, Mr. Chairman.
9	This is the time and place set for a regularly
10	scheduled meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission
11	for the month of January, 2012.
12	This meeting has been scheduled and noticed in
13	compliance with pertinent statutes, including the open
14	meeting law. A copy of the agenda has been handed to
15	the court reporter with the request that it be a part of
16	the official transcript of these proceedings.
17	(Marked Exhibit 1.)
18	MR. HETTRICK: My name is Lynn Hettrick,
19	Executive Director of the Nevada State Dairy Commission.
20	Present today are Mr. Christopher Cook,
21	chairman; Mr. Troy G. Crowther, member of the
22	Commission; Mr. Robert Fletcher, member of the
23	Commission; and certain members of the Dairy Commission
24	staff.
25	Those who present statements or evidence to the
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1	Commission during the meeting are requested to first be
2	acknowledged by the chairman and to identify themselves
3	for the record. And if Mr. Goedert comes in and joins
4	us, please mark him as being present as well.
5	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Would you proceed with
6	the first agenda item, please.
7	MR. HETTRICK: Yes, sir, Mr. Chairman.
8	The first item on the agenda is a is public
9	comment and discussion, if any.
10	I don't see anybody at either location.
11	CHAIRMAN COOK: There is no public here.
12	MR. HETTRICK: All right. So then we're we
13	did our duty.
14	Number two, possible action, license
15	applications, peddler distributor application for
16	National DCP, LLC, from Bellingham, Mass.? Yes, I
17	guess. Thomas Jensen, senior vice president of the
18	operations, is the applicant.
19	They seek a license to distribute fluid milk,
20	fluid cream, and butter in the Southern Nevada Marketing
21	Area. Fluid milk label will be Dean's Country Fresh
22	Dairy.
23	The prices and costs have been reviewed by
24	members of the Dairy Commission staff and are in
25	compliance with this agency's laws and regulations.
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1	The applicant will be responsible for the
2	assessments.
3	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Is there anyone
4	representing this applicant present, here or in Reno?
5	(Mr. Goedert arrived.)
6	CHAIRMAN COOK: It does not appear so.
7	Is there any comments or questions from the
8	staff regarding this?
9	I'm assuming that the Dean's Country Fresh
10	Dairy is unrelated to Dean Foods?
11	MR. HETTRICK: I believe, it is. It says that
12	they did look it says they did not supply product
13	locally, and they're importing this. So I don't think
14	they're related.
15	CHAIRMAN COOK: And do you know where they came
16	from?
17	MR. HETTRICK: I do not.
18	CHAIRMAN COOK: There is a Bellingham,
19	Massachusetts, company that's distributing product in
20	this area.
21	Okay. Well, is there any questions or comments
22	from the Commissioners?
23	Questions or comments from the staff?
24	Questions or comments from the nonexistent
25	public?

1	Seeing none, I will entertain a motion.
2	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Okay. I'll make a
3	motion to approve the peddler distributor license
4	application by National DCP, LLC, Bellingham,
5	Massachusetts, to distribute fluid milk, fluid cream,
6	and butter in the Southern Nevada Marketing Area, fluid
7	milk label to be Dean's Country Fresh Dairy.
8	COMMISSIONER FLETCHER: Second.
9	CHAIRMAN COOK: Having a motion and a second,
10	and no dissenting votes, the motion carries. The
11	application's granted.
12	MR. HETTRICK: Okay. Mr. Chairman, next on the
13	agenda is a retail store importing from out of state.
14	It's El Super, from Paramount, California. Jack Hook is
15	the CFO.
16	The applicant seeks a license to distribute
17	yogurt in the Southern Nevada Marketing Area.
18	Prices and costs have been reviewed by members
19	of the Dairy Commission staff and are in compliance with
20	the agency's laws and regulations.
21	And the applicant will be responsible for the
22	assessments.
23	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Just a clarification.
24	Is that El Super, or is that E-One Super?
25	MR. HETTRICK: I think, it's El Super.
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1	We lost our video. Can you guys see us?
2	MR. ORZECH: Oh, yeah. We got you.
3	MR. HETTRICK: Okay.
4	(There was a period off the record while the
5	video feed was reestablished, 9:07 to 9:09 a.m.)
6	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Are we we're back on
7	the video.
8	MR. HETTRICK: All right.
9	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. So did we determine that
10	that is E-L super or E-One Super?
11	MR. HETTRICK: It's El Super.
12	CHAIRMAN COOK: El Super.
13	MR. HETTRICK: I'm looking at their actual
14	application.
15	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Is there anyone
16	representing this applicant present?
17	Doesn't look like it.
18	Any comments or questions from staff members
19	regarding this application?
20	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: They did check to see
21	if product was available locally; but apparently not.
22	So they are supporting I don't know where they're
23	going to they are getting it locally. It doesn't say
24	it's Nevada. So, you know, it's that's Yoplait. So
25	I don't know where they get it.
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1	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Any questions of the
2	staff from Commissioners?
3	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: I would. So this is a
4	retail store here in southern Nevada, importing?
5	MR. HETTRICK: It should, it should be, yes.
6	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Okay.
7	MR. HETTRICK: Yeah.
8	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: But
9	MR. HETTRICK: It should be.
10	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: where's the which
11	retail store is it? Is it El Super?
12	MR. HETTRICK: It says, it says well, yeah,
13	it's El Super is the store. But they're based out of
14	Paramount, California. But, obviously, they're
15	retailing here. But it says the products it says
16	"What's the source of the products you're going to
17	sell"
18	MS. KATHY EASLY: Lynn?
19	MR. HETTRICK: Yes?
20	MS. KATHY EASLY: You're mumbling into the
21	table, and she's having trouble hearing you.
22	MR. HETTRICK: Okay. I'll try not to mumble
23	into the thing here.
24	We're discussing here the where they're
25	getting the product from. And the application shows
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1	they're getting it from various Nevada and California
2	distributors.
3	MR. ORZECH: And, Lynn, I can probably answer
4	the questions on it.
5	This, this company has stores down in
6	Las Vegas. And they buy locally most of their dairy
7	products from, I believe, Meadow Gold. The problem was
8	they needed some items from they have stores in
9	California. And they needed some items in their stores
10	here that they couldn't get locally. So they talked to
11	us. And, actually, Meadow Gold worked with them and us
12	to get to get them so that they get their own license
13	and they can bring their own product in that can't be
14	supplied locally. So they're it's a very simple
15	thing. They're just looking to bring in, bring in
16	yogurt that they can't, they can't obtain locally.
17	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Is this a Hispanic, an
18	ethnic retail store?
19	MR. JIM BENTLEY: Yes.
20	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Okay.
21	CHAIRMAN COOK: Staff says yes down here.
22	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Those are all my
23	questions.
24	CHAIRMAN COOK: Any other questions?
25	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: No questions.
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	Page 10
1	COMMISSIONER FLETCHER: No.
2	CHAIRMAN COOK: Any questions from staff?
3	Any questions from members of the audience?
4	Seeing none, I'll entertain a motion.
5	COMMISSIONER FLETCHER: I move the Commission
6	approve the license application for El Super as
7	submitted and reviewed by the staff in compliance with
8	this agency's laws and regulations.
9	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Second.
10	CHAIRMAN COOK: We have a motion and a second
11	on the table. And there being no dissenting votes, the
12	motion carries. The license is granted.
13	MR. HETTRICK: Item number three on the agenda,
14	Mr. Chairman, is a license amendment application. The
15	peddler distributor is Core-Mark International,
16	Las Vegas, Nevada. Jenifer Noble is the controller.
17	The applicant seeks a license amendment to
18	distribute the Crave label of fluid milk in the Southern
19	Nevada Marketing Area. Temporary approval was granted
20	by the Executive Director on December 29, 2011.
21	The prices and costs have been reviewed by
22	members of the Dairy Commission staff and are in
23	compliance with the agency's laws and regulations.
24	The applicant will be responsible for the
25	assessments.
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1	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Thank you.
2	I don't see that we have any representation
3	from Core-Mark in Las Vegas. And I sure don't see
4	anybody in Reno. So I'm guessing we don't have anybody
5	here.
6	Any questions or comments from the staff on
7	this application?
8	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: Do we know where Crave
9	comes from?
10	MR. HETTRICK: Yeah, the letter that I'm
11	looking at says "These dairy products are manufactured
12	by Upstate Niagara Cooperative." And they've attached
13	the worksheet and so on.
14	CHAIRMAN COOK: I'm going to assume that
15	Niagara's in New York?
16	MR. HETTRICK: I am, too.
17	CHAIRMAN COOK: It's New York?
18	MR. HETTRICK: I take it that they are.
19	CHAIRMAN COOK: What is unique about the Crave
20	label? Is that one of those
21	MR. HETTRICK: It's a license amendment, so we
22	don't get a lot. It just says they're asking for an
23	amendment, and there's a cost price sheet. So that's
24	about all we get.
25	CHAIRMAN COOK: I wonder if that's one of those
	Page:

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1	milks that has corn oil added to it, you know, to
2	strengthen the fat consistency of it.
3	MR. HETTRICK: Chocolate milk, 12-ounce
4	containers, chocolate, strawberry milk in 12-ounce
5	containers, and ice cream, sherbet from Anderson Dairy,
6	manufacturer of Blue Bunny, are added on the amendment,
7	application amendment.
8	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Well, I have no
9	questions.
10	Any more questions?
11	COMMISSIONER FLETCHER: No questions.
12	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: No questions.
13	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Seeing none, I'll
14	entertain a motion.
15	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: I will make a motion to
16	approve the peddler distributor license amendment
17	application by Core-Mark International, Las Vegas,
18	Nevada, to distribute the Crave label of fluid milk in
19	the Southern Nevada Marketing Area.
20	COMMISSIONER FLETCHER: Second.
21	CHAIRMAN COOK: Having a motion and a second,
22	and there being no dissenting votes, the motion carries.
23	MR. HETTRICK: Next on the agenda,
24	Mr. Chairman, is approval of the minutes. There were no
25	corrections to the minutes. And we simply need a motion
	Page:

Page 13 1 to approve the minutes. 2. COMMISSIONER FLETCHER: I move we approve the 3 minutes of December 14, 2011, State Dairy Commission meeting, as submitted. 4 COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: 5 Second. CHAIRMAN COOK: Having a motion and a second on 6 approval of the minutes, and there's no dissenting 7 votes, it meets our approval. The motions carries. 8 MR. HETTRICK: Next on the agenda is item 9 10 number five, the staff report. The staff report for January 2012, our balance 11 12 carry forward at the end of December was \$545,953. That's an increase of \$5,923.50 from November. 13 I would just remind the Commission that our tax 14 15 holiday, we'll start seeing the impact of that in January, because as they report December sales, they 16 17 will be taking the credit in January. So we anticipate that next month we'll see a significant decrease in 18 that, which is exactly what we're trying to do, if we 19 reduce the reserve amount, which is higher than the 20 21 state recommended amount. So. But I just point it out 22 so that -- in advance, so people are aware of it. 23 The milk price report is printed in your 2.4 packet. Price is going down slightly, but it's not 25 significant in the north. In the south, we -- I don't Page:

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- 1 think -- we may be up today, but when we printed this,
- 2 it hadn't gone down on this report. I don't know if
- 3 there's more on the website now. I know it's current.
- 4 I just don't know what it is. I need to look at it.
- 5 Prices are pretty much stable, have been, and
- 6 they're not -- I mean they fluctuate a little but not
- 7 very much.
- 8 And then, finally, I just want to report on
- 9 northern -- Northern Nevada Development Authority in
- 10 Carson City has been the lead agency. I'm trying to get
- 11 these yogurt companies to come into northern Nevada.
- 12 They've been working with different ones and various
- 13 others, trying to get the companies there.
- 14 They were -- in doing some of that research,
- 15 they've been unhappy with the fact that -- the Governor
- 16 just commissioned a study of what the economy ought to
- 17 look like in Nevada and where we ought to be going and
- 18 all these things we ought to be doing. And it pretty
- 19 much came back -- it was a Brookings Institution study,
- 20 pretty much came back typical of what you see of all of
- 21 them, you know, the future is technology and health
- 22 care. And, then, so we got to go out and find
- 23 technology and health care companies. Like every other
- 24 state in the union, it doesn't have the exact same
- 25 report and isn't doing the exact same things. And we're Page:

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- 1 having to compete with them. It's not an easy thing.
- 2 And NDA went in and looked at the numbers and
- 3 said, "How is it, Brookings, that you could look at
- 4 Nevada's economy, and the third largest sector in
- 5 Nevada's economy is agriculture, and it doesn't even
- 6 give a word mention, not one word mentioned in the
- 7 report?"
- 8 And we are perfectly positioned in Nevada to
- 9 take advantage of that. The biggest market for
- 10 agricultural products and -- and the production of
- 11 agricultural products is, obviously, our neighbors to
- 12 the west, immediately to the west. We ought to be
- 13 looked at to have equipment manufacturers and all kinds
- 14 of processors, and people who do anything that's
- 15 involved with agriculture ought to be looking at us.
- 16 We're at lot better base than California. We're a lot
- 17 easier to get permits, applications to do the building,
- 18 all of the things that should make us more attractive.
- 19 So they decided to form an agricultural
- 20 committee, and they brought people in from all over
- 21 northern Nevada. The first meeting was last week. I'm
- 22 sorry. The first meeting was Monday of this week. I
- 23 lost track of days. And they had about 25 people there,
- 24 very good representation from Nevada. And I was asked
- 25 to go and represent the Dairy Commission.

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The committee's going to go forward. They're 1 going to work on trying, first, to publicize the role 2 3 that agriculture plays. And dairy will be significant in that. The number of jobs, we're going to try to come 4 out with some of the numbers that show what the impacts 5 are for agriculture and their role for the State of 6 Nevada. And then we're going to start working on trying 7 8 to come up with ways to promote more growth, more opportunity in agricultural industry. 9 I have the dubious honor of being elected the 10 chairman of that committee, much to my surprise. 11 12 didn't expect that, and as I'm sitting there, they decided to nominate people, and I got nominated, and 13 they closed it before I could say no. So. So I'll be 14 15 the chair for at least 12 months, maybe a little more. But I think it's an exciting opportunity. 16 17 think it's a good group of people who are trying to promote agriculture, at least get a message out there. 18 I think there is some opportunity to at least pro -- or 19 publicize the fact that agriculture is a much bigger 20 player. The average person, if you talk to them about 21 agriculture in Nevada, they think there is none. You 22 23 know, they think we're just a desert and there is 2.4 nothing. 25 And then the fact is that behind gaming and Page:

Page 17 mining, agriculture's the third largest segment of our 1 entire economy. And it's estimated right now to be 2. 3 1.3 billion of a \$20 billion income economy. So it's quite large. 4 So, you know, we just need to get that out 5 there. And I thought I'd give you a little history and 6 background on that. 7 So. That's all I have, then, unless there are 8 questions. 9 10 CHAIRMAN COOK: Is there any new developments 11 on commonwealth or? 12 MR. HETTRICK: Commonwealth, we have a meeting. I'll be attending the meeting with commonwealth on the 13 They have -- we've seen the agenda for their 14 15 meetings. The 17th, they're going out to Yerington. 16 They will be meeting with the principals of the existing 17 Western Specialties plant. They're going to go all through that plant. They've got morning meetings with 18 19 the county manager from Lyon County and afternoon meetings with the utilities managers in regard to water 20 21 supply and sewage and all of those things that they're 22 going to apply to their plan. 23 Wednesday, they are meeting with three 2.4 producers. Anna in our office up north got, found three 25 producers who are willing to come in and talk to them. Page:

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- 1 And they wanted somebody outside of DFA indirectly
- 2 representing. They wanted to talk to producers. So
- 3 Anna found some producers. And I'll be at that meeting
- 4 as well. And we're going to talk to them about
- 5 supplying and so on, the capability of being able to
- 6 supply their needs, which I think we can do quite
- 7 easily.
- 8 So. And, then, what I'm told is February 8th,
- 9 the CFO of the parent company from Germany is coming
- 10 over to visit northern Nevada.
- 11 So I think they are pretty serious about coming
- 12 in. I hate to -- I mean knock on wood and cross our
- 13 fingers. I won't do anything to, you know, kibosh the
- 14 deal. But I tell you what, I think it's -- right now, I
- 15 think it looks quite good. And they're definitely
- 16 interested in northern Nevada as a site for a yogurt
- 17 manufacturing facility.
- 18 CHAIRMAN COOK: That's good news.
- 19 MR. HETTRICK: So we'd love to see that happen
- and move forward.
- 21 CHAIRMAN COOK: Is the powder plant on
- 22 schedule?
- MR. HETTRICK: We've not heard more about the
- 24 powder plant. It's -- it's in escrow. And we've not
- 25 heard anymore, pro or con. We've heard nothing. But

Page:

Page 19 what we did hear was that they had to finalize or 1 intended to finalize their purchase and plans to move 2. 3 forward in this month, in January. So we fully expect that we'll get word on what 4 they're doing. We've heard no negative, but we've not 5 heard anything else, either, no positive as well. 6 you know, it's -- it's just in escrow. That's all, 7 about all we can really say. 8 9 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. 10 MR. HETTRICK: There's new opportunities that are really -- they're huge for the dairy industry in 11 12 Nevada. 13 CHAIRMAN COOK: Yes. Yes. No question of that. Okay. Thank you. 14 15 MR. HETTRICK: Yeah. Next on the agenda -- excuse me. Next on the 16 agenda is the legal report presented by Warren Goedert, 17 legal counsel for the Dairy Commission. 18 19 MR. GOEDERT: There really isn't anything in the way of a legal report at this time. We're still in 20 21 the same status of not having any legal difficulties. 22 And that's a good thing. 23 If there are any questions or if anybody has 2.4 any questions of me, I'll certainly try to answer them. 25 CHAIRMAN COOK: Well, I'm just -- what do you Page:

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1	do that's so effective that you're keeping us out of
2	legal problems?
3	MR. GOEDERT: I'd tell you, but it's illegal.
4	MR. HETTRICK: Warren's just the big dog in the
5	front yard. Everybody's scared of us.
6	CHAIRMAN COOK: Well, thank you, Mr. Goedert.
7	We appreciate your efforts.
8	MR. GOEDERT: Thank you.
9	MR. HETTRICK: Number seven on the agenda,
10	Mr. Chairman, consideration of any other matters
11	relating to the dairy industry.
12	CHAIRMAN COOK: Does anybody have anything they
13	want to throw on the table? Questions, comments? Input
14	of any kind? Or do you all want to go back to work?
15	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: How about Jim back
16	here?
17	CHAIRMAN COOK: Oh, that's right. This is
18	is this
19	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: This should be his last
20	meeting, I think.
21	CHAIRMAN COOK: This is the last. That's good
22	to
23	COMMISSIONER CROWTHER: We want to recognize,
24	obviously, and Troy brought it up if you guys would
25	like to jump in there, but.
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1	CHAIRMAN COOK: Oh, I want to thank Jim for his
2	efforts and his excellent tour-guiding when he picks us
3	up at the airport. The running dialogue and commentary
4	we get about the state of the dairy industry in the
5	south on the drive over is
6	COMMISSIONER FLETCHER: It's pretty dry.
7	CHAIRMAN COOK: You know, it's like good
8	intelligence.
9	Anyhow, thank you for your years of service.
10	MR. BENTLEY: Yeah.
11	CHAIRMAN COOK: The people of the State of
12	Nevada are going to miss you.
13	MR. BENTLEY: They might be looking for me,
14	too.
15	COMMISSIONER FLETCHER: We appreciate your
16	service, Jim, and wish you well. We appreciate your
17	years.
18	CHAIRMAN COOK: Don't be a stranger. You're
19	welcome to come back and be a member of the public.
20	MR. HETTRICK: Yeah, you can be the public now.
21	MR. BENTLEY: Maybe you maybe inform the
22	public, one of those.
23	MR. COON: Mr. Chairman, or people, if you
24	don't mind, I'd like to just say something, too, in that
25	regard. As a member of the industry, we appreciate
	Page:

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1	everything that Jim has done. He's always been
2	available, very willing to consider any issue that we
3	brought to him, always been responsive and gotten back
4	to us very quickly and just been we appreciate your
5	work.
6	MR. BENTLEY: Thank you for those kind words.
7	MR. COON: Yeah, thank you.
8	CHAIRMAN COOK: Same here.
9	Okay. Anything else?
10	MR. HETTRICK: Again, we have to ask for public
11	comment and discussion under the new rules that we make
12	sure that everybody gets a chance to voice their opinion
13	or whatever else they want to talk about.
14	CHAIRMAN COOK: Well, since the public is
15	rather sparsely represented at this meeting, the public
16	just made his comment.
17	MR. HETTRICK: Yes.
18	CHAIRMAN COOK: I'm assuming we're probably
19	done.
20	MR. HETTRICK: I think we are.
21	CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Given that, we will
22	adjourn this meeting.
