COOK: Let us go ahead and open this 5 November meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission. Mr. Orzech, will you begin the formalities, please? 6 7 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. MR. ORZECH: 8 the time and place set for the regularly scheduled 9 meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission for the 10 month of November, 2013. 11 This meeting has been scheduled and noticed in 12 compliance with pertinent statutes including the open 13 meeting law. A copy of the agenda has been handed to 14 the court reporter with a request that it be part of the 15 official transcript of these proceedings. 16 My name is Tom Orzech, the operations manager 17 for the Nevada State Dairy Commission. Present today 18 are Mr. Christopher Cook, Chairman, and Mr. Troy G. 19 Crowther, member of the Commission. 20 Those who present statements or evidence to the 21 Commission during this meeting are requested to first be 22 acknowledged by the Chairman and to identify themselves 23 for the record. 24 MR. COOK: Would you proceed to agenda item 25 one?

1 Agenda item number one is public MR. ORZECH: 2. comment and discussion. 3 MR. COOK: Anybody from the public want to Seeing none, let's move to agenda item two, 4 comment? 5 please. MR. ORZECH: Agenda item two for possible 6 7 action is a license application. It's a processing 8 distributor license application by Dolcevita Gelato, 6625 Valley View Boulevard, Suite 312, Las Vegas, 9 Nevada, 89118, Salvatore Cesareo, managing partner. 10 11 The applicant seeks to distribute ice cream, 12 sherbet, novelties, frozen yogurt and mixes in the 13 Southern Nevada marketing area. 14 The applicant's prices and costs have been 15 reviewed by members of the Dairy Commission staff and 16 are in compliance with this agency's laws and 17 regulations. The applicant will be responsible for the 18 assessments. MR. COOK: Do we have anybody here representing 19 20 this applicant? I'm guessing not since I don't see 21 anybody down in Vegas except for our distinguished 22 Commissioner, Troy Crowther. 23 MR. CROWTHER: And staff. 24 MR. COOK: And staff, I'm sorry. They're out 25 of camera view. Hello, staff. Anything that the staff

would like to add to this? 1 2. MR. ORZECH: Nothing to add. MR. COOK: This has got to be about the 3 4 three-thousandth gelato processor in Las Vegas. 5 MR. ORZECH: Pretty close. MR. COOK: They must eat a lot of gelato down 6 7 Okay, are there any questions or comments from 8 anybody in the public? Seeing none, I will entertain a 9 motion. 10 MR. CROWTHER: I will make a motion to approve 11 the distributor license application by Dolcevita Gelato, Las Vegas, Nevada, to distribute ice cream, sherbet, 12 13 novelties, frozen yogurt and mixes in the Southern 14 Nevada marketing area. 15 MR. COOK: Since we're lacking our third 16 Commissioner, it will be up to me to second the motion 17 and call for the vote, and inasmuch as there's a motion 18 and a second and no dissenting votes, the motion carries 19 and the license is granted. 20 Press on to number three if you would, please. 21 MR. ORZECH: Agenda item number three for 22 possible action is a license amendment application, 23 Peddler distributor license application by Core-Mark 24 International, 3950 West Harmon Avenue, Las Vegas, 25 Nevada, 89103, Jenifer Noble, controller.

The applicant seeks a license amendment to 1 2. distribute Shamrock Farms label of fluid milk in the 3 Southern Nevada marketing area. Temporary approval was 4 granted on October 22nd, 2013. 5 The applicant's prices and costs have been reviewed by members of the Dairy Commission staff and 6 7 are in compliance with this agency's laws and 8 regulations. The applicant will be responsible for the 9 assessments. 10 MR. COOK: Anybody present representing 11 Core-Mark? Doesn't look like it. Anything the staff 12 would care to add to this? 13 Nothing. MR. ORZECH: 14 MR. COOK: This is the first incursion into Las 15 Vegas of the Arizona brand Shamrock? 16 MR. ORZECH: No, Shamrock is already brought in 17 there. 18 MR. COOK: Pretty well represented, all right. 19 Any comments from --20 MR. CROWTHER: If it was already here, what's 21 the amendment for, just to add fluid milk? 22 MR. ORZECH: This particular distributor has 23 not handled that label before. 24 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. 25 MR. COOK: Any more questions, Troy?

1 MR. CROWTHER: No. 2. MR. COOK: Questions or comments from the 3 public? Questions or comments from staff? 4 Seeing none, I'll make a motion that we approve 5 the Peddler distributor license amendment application of Core-Mark International, Las Vegas, Nevada, to amend 6 7 their license to add the Shamrock Farms label of fluid 8 milk in the Southern Nevada marketing area. 9 MR. CROWTHER: Second. 10 MR. COOK: I have a motion and a second and no 11 dissenting votes. The motion carries and the license is 12 granted. 13 MR. ORZECH: Agenda item 3-b for possible 14 action is another license amendment application by Southwest Traders, Inc., 27565 Diaz Road, Temecula, 15 16 California, 92590, Shelly Jackson, Finance. 17 The applicant seeks a license amendment to add 18 butter, fluid cream, and cottage cheese in the northern 19 and Southern Nevada marketing areas. 20 The applicant's prices and costs have been reviewed by members of the Dairy Commission staff and 21 22 are in compliance with this agency's laws and 23 regulations. The applicant will be responsible for the 24 assessments. 25 MR. COOK: Anybody representing this applicant

present? Seeing none, anything the staff would care to 1 2. add to this? 3 MR. ORZECH: Nothing. 4 MR. COOK: Anything that the public would care 5 to add or comment on? 6 MR. CROWTHER: I do have a question. Is this 7 going to carry that real California seal on it, do we 8 We haven't addressed that for a while. I'm just 9 curious if this is --10 MR. ORZECH: There's no way of knowing. 11 don't even know --12 MR. COOK: We don't know what brand of product 13 they're going to be selling. 14 MR. ORZECH: Yeah, they could be buying this 15 from anywhere in the United States and bringing it in. 16 MR. COOK: We don't know the source of the 17 products, we just know that they're going to be 18 distributing and they're based in California. 19 MR. ORZECH: Right. 20 MR. COOK: Any more questions, Troy? 21 No, I'm done. MR. CROWTHER: 22 MR. COOK: I will entertain a motion then to 23 consider this application, or this amendment. 24 MR. CROWTHER: All right. I will make a motion to approve the amendment for the Peddler distributor 25

- 1 license by Southwest Traders, Inc., Temecula,
- 2 California, to add butter, fluid cream and cottage
- 3 cheese in the northern and Southern Nevada marketing
- 4 areas.
- 5 MR. COOK: I will second that motion, and being
- 6 as there's a motion and a second and no dissenting
- 7 votes, the motion carries and the amendment to the
- 8 license is granted.
- 9 MR. ORZECH: Agenda item number four for
- 10 possible action is approval of the minutes for the
- 11 October 16th, 2013 Dairy Commission meeting, a copy of
- 12 which has been circulated for review.
- MR. COOK: Did you catch any changes or
- 14 amendments, Troy?
- 15 MR. CROWTHER: I'm fine with these.
- 16 MR. COOK: All right. I'll entertain a motion
- on accepting or approval of the minutes for the last
- 18 meeting.
- 19 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. I will make a motion that
- we accept the minutes from the October 16th, 2013
- 21 meeting with the approved corrections.
- MR. COOK: I will second that motion and no
- 23 dissenting votes. The motion carries and the minutes
- 24 are accepted.
- MR. ORZECH: Agenda item number five is a staff

- 1 report for November, 2013. I am still awaiting approval
- 2 to meet with the Deputy Attorney General assigned to the
- 3 Department of Agriculture to discuss the Legacy Ice
- 4 Cream violation.
- 5 I've had discussions with Lynn Hetrick, the
- 6 Deputy Director for agriculture, regarding our growing
- 7 agency reserve. We discussed the assessment rates and
- 8 the possibility of eliminating the assessment on butter.
- 9 This will reduce our annual reserve by approximately
- 10 145,000. It is anticipated that this would be the
- 11 beginning of other rate reductions.
- We may be looking to bring this before the
- 13 Commission for action at a future meeting. The agency
- 14 reserve is \$457,972, and that concludes this report.
- MR. COOK: We lost him.
- 16 Troy, we lost you briefly for a second. Did
- 17 you hear Tom's report?
- MR. CROWTHER: I did.
- MR. COOK: Any questions?
- MR. CROWTHER: No, not really. I just -- I
- 21 know we're looking at different options as far as
- 22 reducing that surplus or at least holding it stable. It
- 23 sounds like there's some things in the works that might
- 24 be beneficial for the industry, so at some point I'd
- like to maybe get on the same page and get a heads-up

- 1 from whomever is throwing out ideas and I'd just like to
- 2 be part of that process I guess, or in the loop.
- MR. COOK: I had a discussion earlier with Lynn
- 4 about this subject and I think we're working on a plan
- 5 to perhaps have you come up for the December meeting and
- 6 we'll have a more in-depth discussion about things we
- 7 can do to try to reduce that reserve and get it under
- 8 control.
- 9 MR. CROWTHER: That would be good. That's all
- 10 I had.
- 11 MR. COOK: Okay. Anything else that staff
- wants to add? Comments, questions, observations, input?
- 13 Okay. Let's move on to the next agenda item.
- MR. ORZECH: Agenda item number six is
- 15 consideration of any other matters relating to the dairy
- 16 industry.
- 17 MR. COOK: Okay. Anybody have anything they
- 18 want to throw out on the table for discussion? Francis,
- 19 do you want to update us on the power plant perhaps?
- 20 MR. PACHECO: Sure. I have a question. This
- 21 week there's an Elite Dairy Producer Conference in Las
- 22 Vegas and listening to what you're saying about you have
- 23 a reserve, are you guys promoting Nevada at this
- 24 conference?
- This conference has producers from around the

- 1 country. DFA probably has 100 some producers from
- 2 Wisconsin, Michigan, New York, Georgia, and we sent I
- 3 think about seven or eight from California, so is the
- 4 Commission present there?
- MR. ORZECH: We are not.
- 6 MR. PACHECO: You're not. So if you want to
- 7 spend some money, I can tell you how to spend money. We
- 8 need to have a bigger footprint as far as when people
- 9 think about expansion or where to establish a new dairy
- 10 entity. We're not getting many people looking at
- 11 Nevada, we're just not, so if you have the money --
- MR. CROWTHER: Is that in terms of producers or
- 13 processors, or both?
- MR. PACHECO: Right now, producers. Producers
- is the key at this point. We're going to have plenty of
- 16 capacity when that plant comes on-line. We're going to
- 17 need milk for that plant.
- MR. COOK: This is taking place when?
- MR. PACHECO: It started on Sunday and it ends
- 20 today.
- 21 MR. COOK: It's ongoing right now?
- MR. PACHECO: It's ongoing right now. Today is
- 23 the final day, and there's events like that -- it would
- 24 have been nice because it's in your backyard. It's a
- 25 yearly event. It's a yearly event.

1 MR. COOK: It happens every year in the same 2 place, or it moves around? 3 MR. PACHECO: The Bellagio, every year. 4 MR. COOK: At the Bellagio this time of year? 5 Every year this time of year. MR. PACHECO: 6 MR. COOK: Do you know if our public 7 information people are aware of this? 8 MR. ORZECH: That's not something I would have 9 any knowledge of. 10 MR. COOK: Do you think it's possible to ask 11 them? 12 MR. ORZECH: I can ask them. 13 MR. COOK: Because that's what they're being 14 paid for, isn't it? 15 It really is the Elite Dairy MR. PACHECO: 16 Producer Conference. These guys coming in are not 17 milking 100 cows. They're the type of clientele you 18 want to come look. That's your --19 I have to confess to being a bit MR. COOK: 20 surprised because this is the first I've heard of it, 21 and I suspect that since this is the first I've heard of 22 it that there may be other people within the Department 23 of Agriculture that are unaware that this thing was even 24 going on. 25 MR. PACHECO: Okay. If I didn't show up today,

you probably wouldn't know about it for another year. 1 2. MR. COOK: You're absolutely right. 3 MR. PACHECO: So I don't know if I have any 4 fliers in my car, but just Google it, Elite Dairy Producer Conference, boom, Las Vegas. 5 6 Okay, so I'm glad you have money to do things 7 like that. I look across the country -- because this 8 one is in your backyard. There are conferences of this 9 magnitude across the nation up in Wisconsin, up in the 10 upper northeast. 11 They had one recently up in the Idaho region, 12 and just having a presence there or be a sponsor or 13 doing something like that gets your name out, and I 14 think that's where our shortfall -- DFA has been putting 15 a lot of effort in to publications and ads and different 16 types of industry magazines, but it also would be good 17 to have somebody from the Department of Ag also along 18 the same rhetoric, that this is a place to be looked at, 19 this is a place -- we're business friendly. You know 20 the pitch as well as anybody. 21 And Troy, you asked about the plant. 22 coming along with the plant very nicely. We have 23 customers prepared for the product. It's actually a 24 We're hitting just the right time. nice fit. 25 looking at the global demand and the plant's product is

- 1 going to be all export. We're working on the logistics 2 right now. We already have a few companies that are going 3 4 to be moving predominantly out of Oakland, the docks off 5 of Oakland, and the one thing that we know, we're not going to have the milk to make the plant as efficient as 6 7 it should be, and so that being said, anything we can do 8 to attract more attention to the opportunities in Fallon 9 for dairy producer expansion would be greatly 10 appreciated. 11 MR. CROWTHER: Francis, what's the farthest you 12 can ship milk to that plant and still be cost effective? 13 Can we ship it from southern Nevada up to there and 14 still be efficient, or how far --15 See, southern Nevada, you're MR. PACHECO: 16 pretty much locked into supplying your Class I market 17 with the plants that are there. I mean, with the milk 18 that is there, you probably have that earmarked and it's 19 going into Class I markets. Either way it's going into 20 a Class I market. 21 MR. CROWTHER: I'm thinking more in terms of
- 21 MR. CROWTHER: I'm thinking more in terms of
 22 expansion, adding dairies down in the Southern Nevada
 23 marketing area. I'm from Mesquite and I drive through
 24 there a few times a month and visit family and there's
 25 still some land that used to be dairy that is just

1 sitting. 2. MR. PACHECO: Well, the issue is the distance because we've earmarked dairies in California to bring 3 4 this way because it's pretty much -- to get to that 5 plant is going to be a three-and-a-half hour drive versus if you go to Mesquite, you're looking at eight 6 7 hours, so --8 MR. CROWTHER: Right, that's my question. Ιt 9 sounds like that's the answer is it's just not efficient 10 to do it from that far. 11 MR. PACHECO: Yeah, it's just not going to make 12 it. So again, it's in everybody's interest to get this 13 area promoted as much as possible. 14 One of the things that we've run into is having 15 the properties listed properly. Even when we do have 16 potential dairy families looking at the area, the land 17 isn't readily being listed to be out on the market. We 18 have one dairy that's in the process of being built 19 They had to go and parcel together different 20 parcels of land where in most locations that's already 21 done for you. 22 People realize here's a good opportunity, you 23 have a real estate agent, you have different types of 24 entities that understand what needs to be done, and most 25 dairies today, that's the key is to get your facility

- 1 along with your feed ground on one location or a close
- 2 vicinity to that location and we're just not seeing that
- 3 happen much in that Fallon area.
- 4 MR. COOK: Is that perhaps a matter of getting
- 5 the agricultural property realtors trained up and
- 6 understand --
- 7 MR. PACHECO: You know, we've had that. We
- 8 have people working there. We brought in a guy from a
- 9 national prospective, Agri-Pro Consultants, and he does
- 10 this cross-country. He's brought dairies into Colorado,
- 11 he's brought dairies into Idaho, he's brought dairies
- 12 across the nation. He has a lot of different
- connections with families, but because there was large
- 14 parcels of land, that's what families look for.
- We were fortunate that the guy that is in the
- 16 process of building, he actually went around and talked
- 17 to the realtors and this guy knew that guy and that
- 18 guy -- you know, and all of a sudden he was able to
- 19 cobblestone I think 2300 acres together, but it's
- 20 500 acres here, 600 acres there, 1000 acres here,
- 21 300 acres there, so that's one of the things that -- and
- 22 I know it's not the Commission's perspective to do that,
- 23 but that's what we're running into.
- MR. COOK: But if there's something we can do
- 25 to try to help promote that, try and bring awareness of

1 that shortcoming. 2. That, and the water issue right MR. PACHECO: The guy buys the land and right after he closed on 3 now. 4 the land, his water is cut off and that's not a good 5 sign, and we'll just rack it up to saying it's a drought 6 year, but water storage needs to be another -- and 7 dairies take water, there's no if's, and's or but's 8 about that. 9 So as far as looking at what can the Dairy Commission do is say, okay, what can we do to provide 10 the resources needed for dairies to be in the area and 11 12 you're going to need more water, so just items of that 13 sort I guess could be done. 14 MR. CROWTHER: How is the local -- the 15 government, county, city, how are they as far as zoning? 16 Are there any issues there? 17 MR. PACHECO: You know, Lynn was brought in on 18 a discussion. The dairy dat has cobbled this land 19 together. He's having issues getting his building 20 permit which has set him back a couple months now which 21 is unfortunate because he was really hoping to have this 22 thing resolved in an expedient manner, so Lynn has been 23 brought in to what this producer is experiencing, so 24 we'll see what he can pull off there. That's within the 25 last month.

1 MR. COOK: Yeah, this is in Lyon County, 2. correct? 3 MR. PACHECO: This is in Smith Valley, so 4 whatever county that's in. 5 MR. COOK: That's Lyon. Do you have any of those kinds of problems with anybody who is trying to 6 7 expand in Churchill, Fallon? 8 MR. PACHECO: Not at this point. One of the 9 things -- because the dairy industry has had a couple poor financial years. We had two families that were 10 11 committed to expanding and substantial expansion, 1000 12 plus cow additions. 13 One was able to go ahead and find the financing 14 package and that was another thing that was cobbled 15 together. The other family did get the resourcefulness. 16 They could go ahead and buy additional ground, and this 17 is where the financial institutions are coming in. 18 would back the acquisition of land, but because the 19 returns on dairy operations have been so poor, they will 20 not loan money on an expansion for free stall or new 21 milk barn or anything of that sort, so --22 MR. COOK: Even with a processing plant ready 23 to take everything they can produce? 24 MR. PACHECO: You've got to look at the 25 historical basis. I mean, they've lost money, so --

MR. COOK: Yeah, but circumstances have 1 2 changed. 3 MR. PACHECO: But it's their money and that's what they're saying. Historically looking at how are 4 5 you going to pay this off, you couldn't have. MR. COOK: But they have practically free money 6 7 from the feds. 8 MR. PACHECO: I know, I understand, but that's 9 the reality. They still are looking at acquiring some 10 financial package to do that, so there are still some 11 challenges there. 12 We have a couple smaller dairies in the area, 13 again, 300 cow dairies, but the type of people that you 14 want to attract are the 2000 cow dairies, the 1500 cow 15 dairy, 3000 cow dairies, but you need the land mass to 16 do that. 17 You just need -- the margins on dairies, even 18 though everybody hears the corn price is coming down, 19 there's a better corn market, hay prices are still out 20 the roof, water prices out the roof, and like I say, 21 cows eat a lot of hay and drink a lot of water, so the 22 returns are not that great. 23 MR. COOK: So the margins have been squeezed. 24 MR. PACHECO: The margins have been squeezed 25 and financing is very tough, very tough.

1 So how's the plant in Fallon? MR. COOK: 2 far away from being in production? 3 It is expected that it will be MR. PACHECO: 4 running milk, running product out the door by the end of 5 the first quarter, so they'll be running water probably the middle of February, make sure the steam and people 6 7 know what they're doing and fully operational, and then 8 ramping it up from there, probably somewhere in March. 9 MR. COOK: And customers are lining up with 10 the --11 MR. PACHECO: We do have customers, and that's 12 the one good thing about having a plant that's being 13 designed and built to give you some opportunities to 14 meet their product demands instead of taking a nonfat 15 dry milk plant and trying to retrofit it where this one 16 is being designed to actually handle those types of 17 products. 18 Francis, given -- and maybe this MR. CROWTHER: 19 is proprietary, and if so, obviously don't answer, but 20 given the current supply that you have right now, what 21 capacity will that plant open at? Not capacity, but 22 what utilization will that plant open at? 23 MR. CROWTHER: We're still in the process. Like I said, we have -- one of the dairies that's been 24 25 vacant up there which went through a bankruptcy, it will

ship two loads of milk when it's populated, so that's 1 2 going to help us a little bit, but he's not planning on putting cows in there until the plant is up and we tell 3 4 them it's up and running. He's a current member, he has two dairies in California and he's set to go. He has a 5 hay ranch over here in Lovelock, so there's two loads of 6 7 milk. 8 The dairy that I'm saying that was having the 9 building permit issues, he was planning on being up and 10 running by April 1st and that was going to be three plus 11 loads of milk, but that's been pushed back now, so right 12 there we've got five loads of milk that would be readily 13 available when the plant is in that ramp-up stage, so we 14 do have some things, but five loads of milk when you 15 have a plant that takes 40 loads of milk, you still have 16 a ways to go. You still have a ways to go. 17 MR. COOK: Thank you. Anybody else have any 18 questions, comments? Dave, do you have anything you 19 want to throw on the table? 20 MR. COON: No, just happy to be here. 21 We're glad to see you. MR. COOK: 22 We're talking about money and how MR. COON: 23 it's to be spent and so forth. I quess I might just touch on the things we continue to be grateful for that 24 25 we receive from the Dairy Commission and that's their

1	oversight and seeing that everyone plays by the same
2	sets of rules and we appreciate the laws that are
3	overseen by the Commission, the health inspections, the
4	equipment laws, the credit laws, all those things, so we
5	continue to be grateful for what you have been doing.
6	And as far as future discussions on how the
7	money is to be spent, I guess everyone will work through
8	that, but we're grateful that this is continuing at the
9	same time.
10	MR. COOK: Thanks for your input. Anybody
11	else? If not, we have one more agenda item.
12	MR. ORZECH: Agenda item number seven is public
13	comment and discussion.
14	MR. COOK: And I'm gathering since we had none
15	at the beginning, we probably will have none at the end.
16	Being none offered, let's go ahead and adjourn
17	this meeting.
