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1 SPARKS, NEVADA; WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 19, 2014; 9:00 A.M. 2. -000-3 4 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Let us convene the 5 February meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission. 6 Mr. Orzech, would you open the proceedings, 7 please. 8 MR. ORZECH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. This is the time and place set for the regularly scheduled meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission for the 10 11 month of February, 2014. This meeting has been 12 scheduled and noticed in compliance with the pertinent 13 statutes, including the Open Meeting Law. A copy of the 14 agenda has been handed to the court reporter with the 15 request that it be part of the official transcript of 16 these proceedings. 17 My name is Tom Orzech, the operations 18 manager for the Nevada State Dairy Commission. Present 19 Mr. Christopher Cook, chairman; Mr. Troy G. today are: 20 Crowther, member of the commission; Mr. John Collier, 21 member of the commission. Those who present statements 22 or evidence to the Commission during this meeting are 23 requested to first be acknowledged by the chairman and 24 to identify themselves for the record. 25 Thank you. Would you CHAIRMAN COOK:

1 proceed to agenda item number one, please. No, I quess 2. that would be number 2a. No, number one. 3 MR. ORZECH: Number one. 4 CHAIRMAN COOK: Yeah. 5 MR. ORZECH: Agenda item number one is public comment and discussion. 6 7 CHAIRMAN COOK: No public here to comment, so let's proceed to the next one. 8 9 Agenda item number two for MR. ORZECH: 10 possible action is a license application. 11 peddler distributor license application by Milk & More 12 Distributing, Post Office Box 9, Pahrump, Nevada, 89041. 13 Ronald Link, managing member. 14 The applicant seeks a new license due to a change of ownership of the current license. 15 16 products and labels remain the same. Distribution will remain limited to the Southern Nevada Marketing Area. 17 18 The applicant's prices and costs have been 19 reviewed by members of the Dairy Commission staff and 20 are in compliance with this Agency's laws and 21 regulations. 22 The applicant will be responsible for the 23 assessments. 24 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. I'm quessing there is 25 nobody present representing. Is there anything the

staff would care to add to this? 1 2. This is just a simple change of MR. ORZECH: ownership. This fellow out of Pahrump distributes 3 4 Anderson products. 5 CHAIRMAN COOK: Oh. MR. ORZECH: So it just changed ownership, 6 7 and nothing more than that. 8 CHAIRMAN COOK: Just Anderson? 9 MR. ORZECH: That's all he had listed, was 10 Anderson products. 11 CHAIRMAN COOK: Oh, wow. So that's good. 12 I'm glad to see it's being kept in state. Okay. Well, 13 I have no further questions. 14 Troy, do you have any further questions? 15 MR. CROWTHER: No. 16 CHAIRMAN COOK: John? 17 MR. COLLIER: No, sir. 18 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. There being no 19 questions from the Commission, any questions from the 20 staff? Comments from the staff? Questions or comments from the voluminous audience? Seeing none, I will 21 22 entertain a motion. 23 MR. COLLIER: Mr. Chairman, I move that we accept the peddler distribution application for Milk & 24 25 More distributing in Pahrump, Nevada, where the

applicant seeks a new license due to a change of 1 2. ownership under the current license, and I move we 3 accept this application. 4 MR. CROWTHER: I second. 5 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Having a motion and a second on the table, and there being no dissenting 6 7 votes, the motion carries and the application is 8 granted. 9 MR. ORZECH: Agenda item three for possible 10 action is reduction of the assessment on butter. will be a discussion on the reduction of the assessment 11 12 on butter to zero. The current assessment rate is one 13 cent per pound. The Dairy Commission may move to reduce 14 the assessment rate of butter. And in order to continue the reduction of 15 16 our reserve amount, it's recommended that we reduce our 17 current assessment on butter. At the current assessment 18 rate of a penny per pound, we presently take in 19 approximately \$10,000 per month on butter. Reducing 20 this rate to zero will reduce our reserve by 21 approximately \$120,000 a year. 22 Of the \$10,000 we take in each month, 23 approximately half of this amount will be a direct 24 monthly savings to our in-state licensees. This would 25 include savings to our dairy processors, casinos, candy

- makers, retail stores, bakeries and speciality butter 1 2 suppliers. Unlike the tax holidays, which happens sporadically, this savings is something that the 3 4 licensees will be able to count on every month. 5 And it's now open for discussion. 6 CHAIRMAN COOK: What is the current status 7 of our reserve? 8 MR. ORZECH: Our current reserve, as of this 9 morning, is \$364,795. 10 CHAIRMAN COOK: We're targeting, what, about 11 230, 250, somewhere in that range? 12 MR. ORZECH: Approximately. 13 CHAIRMAN COOK: All right. Will this action 14 get us on target? 15 It will help get us on target. MR. ORZECH: 16 It depends, a lot of it depends on what spending is done 17 within the next year, and I can't foresee what, I can't 18 guaranty what --19 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Have you had any 20 comments from any of the industry people about it? 21 MR. ORZECH: None. No. 22
- 24 MR. ORZECH: Through the posting of these
- 25 minutes they've been made aware of it.

CHAIRMAN COOK: But they've all been made

1 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. All right. 2. MR. CROWTHER: How much, is our current 3 monthly reserve growing right now? 4 MR. ORZECH: It varies. It depends how much 5 is, to be honest with you, it's going to sound simple, but it depends how much is spent during the month. 6 7 There's savings, there's some savings on salaries. 8 then again, there's been equipment that's been 9 purchased. 10 So it's been up and down. It's been 11 gradually climbing over the past approximately six But it varies. 12 months. It varies every month. 13 not going down, is really what's happening. 14 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. But the equipment 15 that's being purchased, are these, are these purchases 16 that will be, that are one-time purchases, or are they 17 continual? 18 It's equipment that's going to MR. ORZECH: 19 be used in a dairy lab, so it's going to be, it's one 20 time, but it also, we have to have contracts on it to 21 keep it fixed. And then supplies are going to need to 22 be bought, you know, as the testing is done. So there's 23 going to be reoccurring charges with that. But the 24 major parts of the items will be a one-time purchase. 25 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. And do you know how

1 much we're saving, we saved by moving to this facility 2 in Las Vegas? 3 MR. ORZECH: I, I can't give you savings amounts because additional money was also spent in the 4 5 allocation to the Department of Agriculture. 6 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. 7 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. John, any questions? 8 MR. COLLIER: Is \$10,000, is that a yearly 9 amount? 10 MR. ORZECH: No, no. It's \$10,000 per 11 month. 12 MR. COLLIER: Oh, per month. 13 MR. ORZECH: Yes. 14 MR. COLLIER: Oh. 15 CHAIRMAN COOK: It will take a big bite out 16 of that reserve and get us down to the target. 17 MR. ORZECH: And we'll be able to see. 18 key, as we talked about before, if things did change for 19 any possible reason, you can always bring the assessment 20 back. That's always --21 MR. COLLIER: Yeah, that's what I was 22 thinking. 23 MR. CROWTHER: So the proposal is to not 24 eliminate the assessment, it's to reduce it to zero for 25 right now so that in the future we have the option to

increase it again if needed. 1 2. MR. ORZECH: That's exactly right. Because 3 it will still remain that's we are allowed to charge an 4 assessment on butter, but the assessment will be zero. 5 CHAIRMAN COOK: Did I understand you 6 correctly when you said that about half of that \$10,000 7 is paid by domestic-based, locally-based --8 MR. ORZECH: Nevada-based licensees. 9 CHAIRMAN COOK: -- licensees? 10 MR. ORZECH: Yes. Yes. 11 CHAIRMAN COOK: And the other half is coming 12 from out of state. 13 MR. ORZECH: Yes. 14 CHAIRMAN COOK: Who would be paid out of 15 state? 16 MR. ORZECH: Out of state would be companies 17 that have companies here, like say Costco, your 18 Wal-Marts. 19 CHAIRMAN COOK: Oh. 20 MR. ORZECH: I mean, they're companies, you know, but they're actually licensed, their home office 21 22 is out of state. So I looked at, I looked at a lot of the companies that are home-based in the state. 23 did -- maybe a lot of the casinos are probably also 24 25 based out of state. But if they had a casino here, I

looked at that as being -- if the license we send to 1 2 Nevada, is what I looked at. 3 CHAIRMAN COOK: So this basically benefits 4 pretty much anybody that uses butter or distributes 5 butter --6 MR. ORZECH: Yes. Yes. 7 CHAIRMAN COOK: -- at their local level. 8 The little guy that has the bakery down the street 9 doesn't get a benefit, but the guy that supplies it does 10 get the benefit. 11 MR. ORZECH: Depending on who pays the 12 assessment, that's true. Some of the bakeries bring 13 their own butter in, and so they will benefit. 14 will --15 CHAIRMAN COOK: So if they are an importer 16 from out of state, then they'll also get the benefit as 17 well? 18 MR. ORZECH: Yes, uh-huh. 19 MR. COLLIER: Are they assessed on when they 20 bring butter in from out of state? 21 MR. ORZECH: Yes. CHAIRMAN COOK: Well, it seems like it's a 22 proposal that makes a lot of sense to me. I'd like to 23 open it up to comments or questions. Dave, I see you've 24 25 joined us. Do you have anything you'd like to throw in

on this? 1 2. MR. COON: Mr. Chairman, I don't. I 3 apologize, I walked in late. I don't expect you to back 4 up very far. But it's my understanding that we're on 5 item three, and the, the assessment of butter is going to be reduced to zero. 6 7 CHAIRMAN COOK: Correct. 8 MR. COON: Is that for a time being? 9 CHAIRMAN COOK: Well, that's for the 10 foreseeable future. 11 MR. COON: Okay. 12 CHAIRMAN COOK: It's not going to be just a 13 one-time thing. We think that it could be in place for 14 probably several years. 15 Depending on how the budget --MR. ORZECH: 16 CHAIRMAN COOK: Yeah, depending upon how 17 well we manage the reserve fund and get it down and what 18 our spending levels look like. 19 MR. CROWTHER: Do we need to fix a time for 20 this, or can we leave it open? 21 MR. ORZECH: No, there's no need to fix a 22 Because at any time in the future we could be 23 discussing this, as far as raising it us again, if need 24 be. 25 MR. CROWTHER: Okay.

1 Well, I think this makes a CHAIRMAN COOK: 2. lot of sense. If that --3 MR. CROWTHER: Is this the best across the 4 board reduction that we could do, then, as far as our 5 assessments? It makes the most sense based 6 MR. ORZECH: 7 on -- we've had this discussion back even when Mark was 8 still here. Mark and I had this discussion several 9 times about if we were going to reduce anything, it 10 would be reducing butter. Mainly because the amount 11 that we charge, the assessment rate we charge on butter, 12 based, if you take the amount of margin profit that 13 there is on butter, this is the highest possible rate 14 that we charge, based on the margin profit. It was 15 always out of line with everything else. Something 16 needed to be done with it. This is the best way to deal with this one 17 18 Because we can go back and adjust the other ones, 19 I may be coming back to you in six months 20 or so, or even less, and saying let's reduce something 21 But right now this is a good start, to get this else. 22 one done. 23 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. I'm good with it, 24 then. 25 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Are there any other

1 questions or comments? Input from anybody? Seeing 2 none, I will entertain a motion. MR. CROWTHER: I will make a motion. 3 Mr. 4 Chairman, I move that we reduce the current assessment for butter to zero. 5 CHAIRMAN COOK: The wording of that 6 7 satisfactory? 8 MR. ORZECH: Yes, sir. 9 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. 10 MR. COLLIER: I'll second that. 11 CHAIRMAN COOK: There being a motion and a 12 second on the table and no dissenting votes, the motion 13 carries and the assessment is reduced. 14 MR. CROWTHER: When will this take effect, 15 then? 16 MR. ORZECH: That's a good question. 17 discussed this. We're going to make it as of the 1st of 18 March. Because as we send out -- to make a long story 19 short, we send out remittance sheets to our licensees at 20 the end of this month for February, but some, a lot of 21 licensees don't use those forms. So as of 1 March, 22 they're already reporting their February deal. We'll 23 make it effective 1 March. 24 And there's going to be some clean-up. 25 There's going to be several months we'll be cleaning

- 1 this up to get everybody in line. But we'll make it the
- 2 1st of March.
- MR. CROWTHER: Okay.
- 4 CHAIRMAN COOK: If somebody pays an
- 5 assessment unwittingly, then will we refund that money
- 6 back?
- 7 MR. ORZECH: Yes, we will. We'll either
- 8 give them a credit for the following month or cut them a
- 9 check.
- 10 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. All right. Okay.
- 11 Thank you. Would you proceed to agenda item number
- 12 four, please.
- MR. ORZECH: Agenda item number four is for
- 14 possible action, approval of the minutes for the January
- 15 15th, 2014 Dairy Commission meeting. And there were no
- 16 corrections.
- 17 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Would you care to
- 18 make a motion?
- MR. COLLIER: Mr. Chairman, I move we accept
- the minutes of the January 15th, 2014 meeting.
- MR. CROWTHER: Second.
- 22 CHAIRMAN COOK: Motion and second on the
- 23 table, no dissenting votes. Motion carries, minutes are
- 24 approved.
- MR. ORZECH: Agenda item number five is the

- 1 Dairy Commission staff report. Testing continues at the
- 2 Fallon dry powder plant, and they're hoping to be in
- 3 operation by the beginning of April.
- I was just informed this morning that we
- 5 just newly licensed a sheep milking operation in Fallon.
- 6 And what they're going to be doing with the sheep milk
- 7 is freezing it, shipping it to California to be made
- 8 into yogurt. We've had the goats, and now we've got
- 9 sheep.
- 10 CHAIRMAN COOK: I didn't realize you could
- 11 make yogurt from sheep milk. I guess there's no reason
- 12 why you can't. But I thought all they did was make
- 13 cheese with it.
- MR. ORZECH: It's going to be sheep yogurt.
- 15 It's a small operation right now. From what Anna said,
- 16 approximately 50 head right now. So, but that's
- 17 different. That's the first one we've had. First sheep
- 18 operation.
- 19 CHAIRMAN COOK: Is it by, started by anybody
- with prior experience in the dairy industry?
- 21 MR. ORZECH: I don't know. I don't know.
- 22 CHAIRMAN COOK: Gave up on cows and went to
- 23 sheep. There's a joke in there somewhere. I'm not
- 24 going to go there.
- MR. CROWTHER: How many sheep, what's the

size of the herd? Or flock, or whatever? 1 2. I was saying about 50, about 50 MR. ORZECH: head. 3 4 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. Who counted them and 5 are they still awake? Sorry, guys. 6 CHAIRMAN COOK: I think we're going to have 7 to start fining for bad jokes. 8 MR. CROWTHER: Yeah, all right. Sorry. 9 Yeah, we lost you. CHAIRMAN: 10 MS. EASLY: No, we didn't. CHAIRMAN COOK: Oh, you're back. 11 12 MR. ORZECH: And as I, as I currently 13 stated, the Agency reserve at the present is \$364,765. 14 And that concludes the report. 15 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Anything else anybody 16 else in the staff would care to add? Seeing none, press on to number six, please. 17 18 MR. ORZECH: Item six is consideration of 19 any other matters relating to the dairy industry. 20 CHAIRMAN COOK: I had a conversation with Lynn about the IAMCA meeting taking place in Vegas. I'm 21 22 not able to go to that planning meeting, and I'm not 23 sure if John or Troy have --24 MR. COLLIER: What is the meeting? 25 CHAIRMAN COOK: It's at the end of this

month. First of March? 1 2. MR. ORZECH: They have not sent any information on it. 3 4 MR. COLLIER: But what is it? 5 MR. CROWTHER: Does he know, John --6 CHAIRMAN COOK: They plan for the annual 7 meeting in August. They plan the agenda. 8 MR. CROWTHER: Do you know --9 MR. COLLIER: Who is the organization? 10 MR. ORZECH: It's the International Association of Milk --11 12 CHAIRMAN COOK: Control Agencies. 13 MR. ORZECH: Control Agencies. And they 14 hold a planning meeting in the spring to plan their 15 meeting in August. And they choose, so they chose --16 they're going to be down in Vegas. I believe it's in 17 March. 18 CHAIRMAN COOK: Troy, do you want to throw 19 something out? 20 Yeah. Well, no. I was just MR. CROWTHER: 21 going to explain to John what the IAMCA means, but you 22 got that. 23 So, you know, we, we went, I've been to one 24 of those, and honestly, it was, I was a new commissioner 25 at the time, and I probably learned more from that

- 1 conference than I learned in any time prior to that, and
- 2 possibly since.
- I think, there's a lot of discussion about
- 4 global agencies and global markets and things that I
- 5 think are relevant to what we're dealing with now, you
- 6 know, in Nevada. It, it was, it was interesting and it
- 7 was, I thought, very beneficial. If, if you can give me
- 8 dates and times, I wouldn't mind stopping by the
- 9 planning here.
- 10 MR. ORZECH: Once I get that information,
- 11 I'll shoot it out to everyone.
- MR. CROWTHER: Okay. I don't know how much
- 13 time I'll be able to spend at it. It's, March is a busy
- 14 time.
- 15 CHAIRMAN COOK: We just thought that since
- 16 the meeting was taking place in Las Vegas it might be
- 17 nice to show the flag of the Nevada Dairy Commission.
- MR. ORZECH: Yeah.
- 19 CHAIRMAN COOK: And --
- MR. CROWTHER: Yeah.
- 21 CHAIRMAN COOK: And it brought up the second
- 22 point I wanted to put out for discussion. Mark and I --
- 23 Mark and I? Lynn and I discussed the possibility of
- 24 trying to attract their annual meeting back to Nevada.
- 25 The last time it was held here was ten years ago. I


- 1 think it was 2004, when it was held at the Silver
- 2 Legacy. And Lynn liked the idea of trying to do that.
- 3 And we felt that if we're going to do something like
- 4 that, that we better have a presence show up at their
- 5 August meeting, if we can, and have somebody at their
- 6 planning meeting.
- 7 They're good meetings to go to.
- 8 International, mostly because it's Canadian and U.S.
- 9 regulatory agencies that are involved in the dairy
- 10 industry. There's usually input from the USDA. They
- 11 have views of the industry from, from academics, usually
- 12 have people participating from, the University of
- 13 Pennsylvania has got a pretty powerful dairy program
- 14 there.
- 15 And it always involves some sort of a field
- 16 trip to a producer or a processor. I know, I think the,
- 17 I've been to three of them now, and all three times we,
- 18 the field trips were quite interesting and you got to
- 19 see how other people operated in other parts of the
- 20 country, and in Canada.
- MR. COLLIER: How long are the meetings? I
- 22 mean, is it, like --
- 23 CHAIRMAN COOK: Usually three days.
- MR. COLLIER: Three days? Is that something
- 25 I should attend, or --

1 CHAIRMAN COOK: I think so. I think that 2. that would be beneficial for your knowledge base, number 3 And getting to know some of the names of the 4 people. 5 MR. COLLIER: Sure. Well, if you Sure. give me the dates, I could schedule it. 6 7 CHAIRMAN COOK: Well, I think we've only 8 got, what, \$1,500? 9 MR. ORZECH: Yeah. All the planning is 10 based on money, and there's no money for travel. 11 Then I won't go. MR. COLLIER: 12 CHAIRMAN COOK: We may not be able to pull 13 it off this year, but in coming years. 14 MR. COLLIER: Yeah. Well, if that's 15 something that would benefit us, you know, from my being 16 there, I would be happy to go do it. But if there's no 17 money there to support it or sustain it, well --18 CHAIRMAN COOK: Well, there's money there, 19 we just have to get it budgeted in the future. 20 especially if we're going to try to attract a meeting to the state, because that brings in a couple of hundred 21 22 people. And usually --23 MR. COLLIER: Well, if we were going to do that, that would be, that would be smart business for us 24 25 to be there and to fly the flag and pump a few hands,

1 you bet. So --2. CHAIRMAN COOK: At any rate, Troy, if you have, when you get the information, if you have an 3 4 opportunity to stop by wherever they're meeting down 5 there and just press the flesh and let them know that we 6 still exist. Because we haven't had a presence at any 7 of their meetings for about three years or four years 8 now, I don't think. 9 Right. MR. CROWTHER: 10 CHAIRMAN COOK: Isn't it about that? 11 Actually, it may be even longer, because I think 2009 12 was the last one we went to. 13 MR. CROWTHER: Mark was very involved with 14 that group. He was on, I don't know if he was on the 15 board or he was just on some committees. But I know he 16 was, he was involved. So, yeah, if you can give me that 17 information, and then I'll see what I can do as far as 18 getting over there. 19 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Appreciate that. 20 Anyhow, so, you know, that's something that, hopefully, 21 we can, dual purpose there to get you up to speed --22 MR. COLLIER: Sure. 23 CHAIRMAN COOK: -- get you background --24 MR. COLLIER: I'd be happy to, you know, to 25 go down there.

1 CHAIRMAN COOK: And then also maybe attract 2 a meeting back to Nevada. 3 MR. COLLIER: Sure. 4 CHAIRMAN COOK: Get some benefits. 5 MR. COLLIER: Sure. Yeah. Maybe Troy and I could go together to the thing, or something. But if, 6 7 you know, whatever. You guys point me in the right 8 direction. 9 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Any other items for 10 consideration? 11 MR. CROWTHER: I have nothing. 12 MR. COLLIER: I have nothing. 13 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Move on to the last 14 agenda item, number seven. 15 MR. ORZECH: Agenda item number seven is 16 public comment and discussion. 17 CHAIRMAN COOK: Okay. Well, Dave, since 18 you're the only member of the public here, if you have 19 any comments, now is your chance. 20 No. Just thanks for your good MR. COON: 21 work. 22 MR. CHAIRMAN: Well, thank you for thanking 23 Thank you for showing up at the meetings. 24 MR. COON: Thank you. 25 CHAIRMAN COOK: Anything else? Staff?
