SPARKS, NEVADA, THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 19, 2015, 1:00 P.M. 1 ---000---2. 3 MR. COOK: Okay. It's now time to convene the 4 February meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission. 5 Mr. Hernandez, would you start the proceedings, 6 please. 7 MR. HERNANDEZ: Sure. David Hernandez for the 8 record. 9 This is the time and place set for the 10 regularly scheduled meeting of the Nevada State Dairy Commission for the month of February 2015. This meeting 11 12 has been scheduled after notice in compliance with 13 pertinent statutes, including the open meeting law. 14 The copy of the agenda -- a copy of the agenda 15 has been handed to the court reporter with the request 16 that it be part of the official transcript of these 17 proceedings. 18 My name is Damon Hernandez, southern area 19 administrator, for the department of agriculture. Present 20 today are Mr. Christopher Cook, chairman; Mr. Troy 21 Crowther, member of the commission; Mr. John Collier, 22 member of the commission. 23 Those who present statements or evidence to the commission during this meeting are requested to first be 24 25 acknowledged by the chairman and to identify themself for

1 the record. 2. MR. COOK: Thank you. 3 Would you proceed to the first agenda item, 4 please. 5 MR. HERNANDEZ: First item on the agenda, Mr. Chairman -- David Hernandez for the record -- is 6 7 public comments and discussion. 8 MR. COOK: Anybody here from the public care to 9 make any comments at this point? 10 Seeing none, let's proceed -- anything down 11 there? 12 MR. HERNANDEZ: No, nothing yet for public 13 comment or discussion. 14 MR. COOK: Okay. Let us proceed to the second 15 item, please. 16 MR. HERNANDEZ: Okay. For possible action, 17 license application, peddler distributor, the Coca Cola 18 Company. 19 This applicant seeks a license to distribute 20 fluid milk and fluid cream in the northern and southern 21 Nevada marketing areas. Temporary approval was granted by 22 staff management on December 9th, 2014, pending board 23 approval of the application. 24 The applicant's prices and costs have been 25 reviewed by members of the dairy commission staff, and are

in compliance with this agency's laws and regulations. 1 2. The applicant will be responsible for the 3 assessments. 4 MR. COOK: Do we have anybody present 5 representing Coca Cola Company? MS. RHOADES: Hi. Good afternoon, everybody. 6 7 My name is Meshach Rhoades, and I am here representing the 8 Coca Cola Company. 9 MR. COOK: Can you spell your name, please, for 10 the court reporter? 11 MS. RHOADES: Sure. It's M-e-s-h-a-c-h. 12 That's my first name. And my last name is Rhoades, 13 R-h-o-a-d-e-s. 14 And I'm here on behalf of the Coca Cola 15 Company. And you might hear me say TCCC. That is an 16 acronym for the Coca Cola Company. 17 Okay. Thank you. MR. COOK: 18 We had some questions when this application 19 came up last week, mostly related to the product itself 20 and how it was going to be retailed? Can you describe the 21 product to us? 22 MS. RHOADES: Sure. Absolutely. 23 So the Coca Cola Company, TCCC, is a distributor for milk, for a milk product. 24 It's named 25 Fairlife? And that is both the name of the product and

also the processor and manufacturer of the product. 1 2. We have several different varieties that we are intending to distribute. We have a chocolate two percent 3 4 milk in a 52 ounce, we have a whole white milk in a 52 ounce, a two percent white milk in 52 ounce, a skim milk 5 in a 52 ounce, a chocolate two percent milk in an 11 and a 6 7 half ounce, and a two percent white milk in an 11 and a 8 half ounce. 9 MR. COOK: Okay. And these are products that 10 are sourced from where? 11 MS. RHOADES: These are products that Coca Cola 12 intends to distribute from its processor manufacturer, 13 Fairlife. 14 MR. COOK: Okay. I'm sorry, I didn't -- where 15 was that? 16 MS. RHOADES: The processor manufacturer's name 17 is Fairlife. 18 MR. COOK: Oh, okay. 19 That brand? Right. MS. RHOADES: 20 MR. COOK: And that's located in Texas, is it? 21 MS. RHOADES: The Coca Cola Company is 22 located -- headquartered in Atlanta, Georgia; however, I 23 think in our application we listed its Sugar Land address 24 because that is the subsidiary that this product is

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actually going through.

1 MR. COOK: Okay. But my -- my question is 2. related to where is the milk itself coming from. 3 The milk itself is coming from MS. RHOADES: 4 Fairlife, which is an entirely separate company from the 5 Coca Cola Company? Coca Cola is just a distributor and Fairlife is the processor. 6 7 I believe Fairlife's address -- I actually 8 don't have Fairlife's address right off the top of my 9 I don't represent Fairlife. 10 MR. COOK: I don't need the exact address. 11 were just curious about the state that it was coming from. 12 MS. RHOADES: You know, I can get that 13 information to you. I don't have that on me. 14 MR. COOK: I think we may have it. 15 don't recall at this point in time. Because I think we 16 discussed it. 17 MS. RHOADES: Oh, I'm sorry. My apologies. 18 The source of the products is Fairlife in Coopersville, 19 Michigan. 20 MR. COOK: Michigan. Okay. 21 MS. RHOADES: That's right. 22 MR. COOK: And it's a UHT product? 23 MS. RHOADES: Yes and no. The UHT and UP designations really depend on the size of the product. 24 25 The 52-ounce products are UP and the 11-and-a-half-ounce

1 products are UHT. 2. MR. COOK: And will these be sold out of normal dairy cases or will they be put on just regular display 3 4 shelves, not refrigerated? 5 MS. RHOADES: You know, I don't have the answer to that question. I believe that UP products, because 6 7 they're not UHT, they are UP, will be sold out of the 8 dairy case. I can get you the answer to your question on the 11-and-a-half-ounce UHT product. I do not know that. 9 10 MR. COOK: Okay. 11 Troy, do you have any questions? 12 MR. CROWTHER: 13 MR. COOK: John? MR. COLLIER: None I can think of at this 14 15 moment. 16 MR. COOK: Any questions from staff or any 17 members of the audience? Any questions down there from 18 anybody? Comments? Observations? 19 I do have one question. MR. COLLIER: 20 Is this product considered to be a milk product I mean, is it -- is it supplemented with other 21 per se? 22 types of additives or other types of materials to make it 23 like an energy drink or something? 24 MS. RHOADES: No, it is a real milk product. 25 MR. COLLIER: It's a real milk product.

1 MS. RHOADES: Yes, sir. 2. MR. COOK: Any other questions? Seeing no more questions or no more 3 Okay. 4 comments, I will entertain a motion. 5 MR. COLLIER: Mr. Chairman, I'll move that the peddler distributor application for Coca Cola Company 6 7 headquartered in Sugar Land, Texas, be accepted by this commission to distribute fluid milk and fluid cream in the 8 northern and southern marketing areas in the State of 9 10 Nevada. 11 MR. CROWTHER: Second. 12 MR. COOK: Having a second -- motion and a 13 second, and no dissenting votes, the motion is carried and 14 the license is granted. 15 Thank you for attending, Ms. Rhoades. 16 MS. RHOADES: Thank you much for having me. 17 appreciate it. 18 MR. COOK: Okay. Mr. Hernandez, will you 19 proceed, please? 20 MR. HERNANDEZ: Sure. David Hernandez for the 21 record. 22 Mr. Chairman, next item on the agenda for 23 possible action, approval of the minutes for January two 24 thousand -- January 15, 2015, dairy commission meeting. 25 MR. COOK: Looks like we have several

1 corrections. 2. MS. EASLY: Did you get the second page? Yeah. 3 MR. COOK: Yeah. Did everybody get the second 4 page of corrections that were --5 MR. CROWTHER: I just got one page. This is the -- okay. I -- apparently I have everything. 6 7 MR. COOK: Okay. We'll entertain a motion on 8 the adoption of the minutes. 9 MR. CROWTHER: All right. I'll make the 10 motion. 11 I move that we adopt the minutes, approve the 12 minutes, with the -- of the January 15th, 2015, State of 13 Nevada Dairy Commission meeting with the indicated 14 corrections. 15 MR. COLLIER: I will second that, Mr. Chairman. 16 MR. COOK: Okay. Having a second -- excuse me, 17 a motion and a second and no dissenting votes, the motion 18 carries. Minutes are adopted. 19 Move onto the next agenda item. 20 MR. HERNANDEZ: Next item on the agenda, update 21 on the pest abatement program. 22 I do not have an update on that program at this 23 Lynn might have had one, but I do not have one at 24 this time. 25 MR. COOK: Okay. Well, then, we can pass over

that and move onto the next one. 1 2. Chris -- Mr. Chairman, what was MR. CROWTHER: the -- what was the deadline that they had to -- for this 3 4 spring to submit applications? 5 MR. COOK: I believe it was the end of January, wasn't it? And they had -- I think they had pretty much a 6 7 very narrow window of time to actually begin the program, 8 that I don't think the weather's been conducive for it. 9 Hasn't been cold enough. 10 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. 11 All right. Nothing else. 12 MR. COOK: If you want, I can -- I can ask Lynn 13 to send out an email update. 14 MR. CROWTHER: I was remembering something 15 about March. I don't know if that was --16 MR. COOK: Well, I think that's the time frame 17 with which they have to use -- apply --18 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. 19 MR. COOK: -- the product to be able to achieve 20 the results. But it hasn't been cold enough and it hasn't forced the birds to congregate in large enough numbers to 21 22 justify going to the expense at this point apparently. 23 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. 24 MR. COOK: Okay. Any --25 MR. CROWTHER: I guess that's good and bad.

1 MR. COOK: Yeah, maybe. It'll be our luck 2. it'll turn cold in the last week. 3 MR. CROWTHER: Yeah. Okay. 4 MR. COOK: And then the time frame will run 5 out. So. MR. COLLIER: Or it'll get cold in April. 6 7 MR. COOK: Yeah, yeah. Just when everybody's 8 fruit trees are setting blossoms. 9 MR. COLLIER: Or May. 10 MR. COOK: Okay. Damon, would you please 11 proceed. 12 MR. HERNANDEZ: Sure, Mr. Chairman. 13 Next item on the agenda, staff report. For the 14 staff report I basically have a brief budget summary 15 update. I forwarded one of these up there to you guys. 16 Hopefully you have that. 17 Real briefly, the net revenue year to date was 18 \$487,132.86. Net revenue year to date, excluding the 19 balance forward, of \$466,176. Excluding that is 20 \$20,956.86. At this time the projected net revenue at 21 fiscal year end, excluding the balance forward, is 22 \$182,775.03. And the projected balance forward at fiscal 23 year end is projected at \$648,951.03. 24 MR. COOK: Unless I'm reading your budget 25 document wrong here, it looks to me like the year to date

revenues are all significantly higher than had been 1 2 projected? 3 MR. HERNANDEZ: Yeah. From a -- a projected --4 not a projection, but compared to how it was budgeted for 5 the year, our revenues are actually running under budget by about 250,000. 6 7 On expenses -- this is an aggregate -- we're 8 running about \$700,000 under budget on that, too. So from a big picture we're factoring all that in, that's where we 9 10 are looking at now from a projection standpoint. 11 I can tell you since the -- in the last month, 12 which is January, the period -- the actual period most 13 recent to what we're in now, there was higher than 14 expected assessments collected, plus there was a one-time transfer from traffic and safety around 63 dollars --15 16 \$63,000, plus higher than expected revenues of 40,000. 17 That's 100,000 that wasn't budgeted because it -- those 18 actuals were anticipated. 19 So that's basically a snapshot of where we are 20 now there. But the comment that you made is -- those kind 21 of ring true with where we are. You know, that's 22 basically it. 23 I guess the reason for the -- for MR. COOK: 24 the comment was curious if the increase in year to date 25 actual versus projected is due to the fact that there are

more dairy product being sold in the state. 1 2. Is that a fair assumption to make? 3 I think you can make that MR. HERNANDEZ: correlation on the revenue side based on the fact that 4 5 we're -- like, for example, the last period we had higher than expected revenues collected. So I think that would 6 7 be a fair statement. On the revenue side. 8 MR. COOK: Well --MR. HERNANDEZ: On the expense side we're under 9 10 budget on the expenses. As you probably know, there are a 11 lot of adjustments made at year end that could compensate 12 for some of that. 13 Also, some of that will be -- you know, we no 14 longer have the -- the salary of the auditor that was 15 originally budgeted in this budget. It got transferred 16 over to the grant side. And that was effective -- I think 17 it was as of the month of August of 2014. 18 So we've had that reduction in expenses 19 compared to what was budgeted. And then just some reduced 20 actual expenses compared to the budget up to this point 21 within the fiscal year. 22 MR. COOK: Now, do we have the lab operating 23 yet? 24 MS. VICKERY: For the record, Anna Vickery. 25 Yes.

1 MR. COOK: And we have a microbiologist on 2. staff --3 MS. VICKERY: No. 4 MR. COOK: -- at this point? 5 Not yet? MS. VICKERY: Not yet. We have to go through 6 7 legislative approval. 8 MR. COOK: Oh, okay. Okay. 9 MR. CROWTHER: Did -- let me revisit that. 10 You said there's a 712,000? Is that what -- is 11 that what I'm seeing? 712,000 expense under budget? 12 MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes. Yes. Now, the majority 13 of that number is from a cost allocation within the 14 department that's -- administratively they allocate costs 15 to -- among the different divisions, which is budgeted at 16 around 588,000. So we still are anticipating cost 17 allocation to hit at some point between now and the end of 18 the fiscal year. 19 MR. CROWTHER: So that 588,000 line item could 20 potentially -- that -- that under budget could potentially 21 go away or at least --22 MR. HERNANDEZ: Significantly, yes. 23 Okay. We're not -- we're not MR. CROWTHER: really looking at \$712,000 under budget on expenses by 24 25 the -- by the time you get to the end of the year.

1 MR. HERNANDEZ: Right. And, again, this is year to date actuals, plus the remainder of the year 2. 3 projected. 4 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. 5 And, you know, I got to go with MR. HERNANDEZ: what's actual and the rest is projected. But that's where 6 7 the lion's share of that is. 8 MR. COOK: Okay. John, any questions? 9 MR. COLLIER: What's the traffic safety 10 transfer? What's that all about? What's that have to do 11 with dairy? 12 MR. HERNANDEZ: I'll have to find the specific 13 answer for that, but I think it's -- it's what we call 14 snatch and grab. It's funds that we get transferred into 15 our -- into our budget account as part of a grant that is 16 out there. But before I -- before I start speculating on 17 that, I can get -- I can get you a specific answer by the 18 next meeting. 19 That's fine. MR. COLLIER: 20 MR. COOK: Okay. Any other questions? 21 Observations? Comments? 22 Does that conclude your report? 23 MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes, it does, Mr. Chairman. 24 MR. COOK: Okay. Well, let's move onto the 25 next item then.

1 Next item, consideration of any MR. HERNANDEZ: 2. other matters relating to the dairy industry. 3 MR. COOK: Okay. Well, you all see that 4 Mr. Trace is here. And we were asking him before the 5 meeting started about the effects of the dock workers strike on Fallon. So perhaps he could give us an update 6 7 on the impact of that. 8 MR. TRACE: Sure. I quess, for the record, Al Trace from Dairy 9 10 Farmers of America, Western Fluid Group. 11 I -- I would say that the port strike, as I 12 like to refer to it, or the dock strike, is affecting us. 13 We don't know yet in -- in what way other than I would say 14 negatively right now. We have product sitting. 15 The product we are sending out -- 90 percent of 16 our product out of Fallon is going to China, Yili and 17 Wahaha, the two major companies over there. And it has a 18 two-year shelf life. 19 So we don't anticipate the strike lasting two 20 years, but nonetheless, it just don't bode well for our 21 customers in China looking at America in general. Just --22 it's just not a healthy thing. 23 I couldn't give you exact dollar amount of what's going on there, but I would say it is affecting us 24 25 along with other dairy companies, dairy being perishable,

more -- other than our powder products. 1 2. I don't know if that answers your question, but it is affecting us along with the general dairy 3 industry -- all industries, but I think it's having a 4 larger impact on dairy possibly than anything else. 5 And I would say, as long as we're talking, too, 6 7 if that's okay, you know, the -- I think we talked about 8 Fallon, the -- not doom and gloom or negativity, but the farm gate price for 2015 isn't real good. We're looking 9 10 at four fifty to six dollars under less this year than 11 dairy farmers were making last year -- or, for the last 18 12 months as an average. So our crystal ball, industry experts, would 13 14 say end of third quarter, middle of fourth quarter 2015 15 with the pipeline should be cleaned out and prices should 16 start to rebound. But makes a difficult situation. 17 We're still trying to relocate dairy farms in 18 this area, and nobody has a real appetite to relocate when 19 they're taking that big of a pay cut. So people are going 20 to hunker down, survival mode, if you will, so. 21 MR. COOK: Are they seeing anything positive on 22 the cost side? Are the margins --23 MR. TRACE: Well, that's --24 MR. COOK: -- holding? MR. TRACE: -- the only -- that's -- that's a 25

1 good point, Mr. Cook. 2. That's -- that's the only positive as compared to '08 and '09. Feed costs aren't as high. You know, 3 4 corn is still below four dollars a bushel. You know, last 5 time we went through a cycle like this feed costs were incredibly high. Corn was seven dollars. 6 Soybean, I 7 don't know, it was -- it was outrageously high, so. 8 But, you know, they have short memories. 9 There's dairy producers across the country that lost 10 generations of equity, if they manage to stay in business 11 at all, so there are just really -- even though it's not 12 quite the same, they -- they just look at it with a wary 13 eye, you know. I mean, they're just sitting tight, so to 14 speak, so. 15 MR. COOK: Are there any herd reduction 16 programs kicking in yet or --17 MR. TRACE: No, no, there isn't. The -- the --18 in the last farm bill, part of the farm bill was milk 19 protection plan that was passed where dairy farmers can 20 buy insurance costs, if you will, to -- to -- for their --21 between their -- their price of milk and feed costs, their 22 margin. 23 There's different levels. You can basically get a four dollar level at a hundred dollars. 24 25 encouraged our producers to do that. I think this --

figures I've seen, 51 percent of dairy producers across 1 2. the United States signed up for that portion of the -- of 3 the -- of the program. So not buy-out but a little bit of 4 protection, if you will, so. 5 MR. COOK: Got to be getting a little bit of break with --6 7 MR. TRACE: That's what --8 MR. COOK: -- transportation costs --9 MR. TRACE: Yeah --10 MR. COOK: -- with the diesel fuel --MR. TRACE: -- yeah. 11 12 MR. COOK: -- being down. 13 MR. TRACE: Yeah, that's helped, too, you're 14 right. 15 MR. COLLIER: Is that like buying on the hedge? 16 Buying on the hedge market? Is that what that is? 17 MR. TRACE: Pretty much, yeah, yeah. And we 18 have our own -- of course, it's our own in-house hedging 19 program, too, the producers can use over and above the 20 national program if they choose to. 21 MR. COOK: Do you have any plan B in place in 22 case this dock strike stretches on? 23 MR. TRACE: No. 24 MR. COOK: Shipping to Canada or Mexico or east 25 coast ports or gulf coast?

1 MR. TRACE: Like you say, I like to have a No. 2. long -- I'd like to have a long answer there, but we 3 really don't. Possibly so after this meeting, maybe 4 elaborate more on next meeting. But at this point, no, 5 no. 6 MR. COOK: Okay. 7 MR. CROWTHER: Is this affecting -- are you --8 are you still processing the same volume of milk in 9 Fallon? 10 MR. TRACE: Yes. 11 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. So that hasn't slowed 12 You're just stockpiling it. 13 MR. TRACE: Correct. 14 MR. CROWTHER: Okay. 15 MR. COOK: Can't stop the cows. 16 MR. TRACE: No, the cows need to be milked 17 seven days a week. 18 MR. COLLIER: Twice and --19 MR. TRACE: Twice and sometimes --20 MR. CROWTHER: That was my question. 21 The follow-up would have been what's happening 22 to the surplus milk --23 MR. TRACE: Yes. 24 MR. CROWTHER: -- but sounds like that's not an 25 issue.

1 MR. TRACE: Yeah, yeah. 2. Well, you know, if it will continue, you know, 3 we do have plans across the country that we can move some of that milk into a condensing plant or something like 4 5 But, I mean, you know, it's transportation. 6 And so the short answer to Mr. Cook's question 7 The -- if it -- if it persists we will have to 8 come up with plan B. And I don't have anything in 9 concrete what that might be right now, but we would have something to alleviate some sort of pressures. 10 11 MR. COOK: Yeah. 12 MR. TRACE: Yeah. 13 MR. COOK: Yeah, interesting, the dock workers' 14 average salary down there is \$145,000 a year. And they 15 have a \$38,000 a year health plan. 16 MR. TRACE: Yeah. 17 MR. COOK: And I guess part of the complaint is 18 they're squawking about being deemed a Cadillac health 19 care plan and getting nailed with the Obama care costs. 20 MR. TRACE: It's hard to feel too bad being part of the dairy community just based on what you said 21 22 there. 23 MR. COOK: So, Gary, you had an observation? 24 Comment? Question? 25 MR. RECK: Gary Reck with Model Dairy.

1 Just a potential opportunity for Al and the 2. Fallon powder plant that we are going to discuss after 3 this meeting. So everything -- I don't think it's the right time for that discussion. 4 5 MR. COOK: Okay. I understand that. Okay. Well, thank you. 7 Are there any other -- Anna? 8 MS. VICKERY: Yes. Just want to let everybody know that Lynn and some of the other staff members were 9 10 able to attend the dairy agriculture show in Tulare last 11 week? 12 MR. COOK: Oh, yeah, yeah. 13 MS. VICKERY: And so they did have the 14 opportunity to speak with about ten, 15 dairymen that had 15 some interest, but two or three were very, very 16 interested. And I do belive they gave them your --17 MR. TRACE: Sure. 18 MS. VICKERY: -- numbers. 19 So hopefully we get some benefits from going 20 down there. 21 MR. COOK: How -- how was that --22 MR. TRACE: That was beautiful. 23 well-attended. It was beautiful weather. And it's a 24 three-day -- I mean, I think we're all aware of the ag expo, and, you know. 25

1 MR. COOK: How's the Smith Valley operation 2. coming along? 3 MR. TRACE: Smith Valley will be completely 4 finished probably by April 1st. We're still struggling with a few community challenges. And we're yet to get a 5 CAFO permit that we're working on diligently. But we'll 6 7 get there. 8 It's going to be beautiful. I would encourage everybody to go look at it. There's a great family. 9 10 going to be the most -- not -- it's the nicest, newest 11 dairy farm in the State of Nevada. It's state of the art. 12 It's a very beautiful facility. It's incredibly nice. 13 Great family, so. 14 MR. COOK: And when -- and they haven't started 15 bringing in animals yet? 16 MR. TRACE: Not yet, no, no. It will be 17 ready -- we'd like to first of April, mid-May, they'll be 18 ready to go if we can get all the other stars aligned, Is 19 dotted, Ts crossed, which we're fully anticipating we 20 will --21 MR. COOK: Well, yeah --22 MR. TRACE: -- you know. 23 MR. COOK: -- I think we should try to make 24 some effort to do some sort of an official welcome or glad 25 you're here.

We -- we would appreciate that. 1 MR. TRACE: 2. We're -- we're right in the process right now putting different things in different papers in the northern 3 4 Nevada area welcoming the family to the -- to the area, 5 and --Who is the family? 6 MR. COOK: 7 MR. TRACE: They're called the Vlot family. 8 They're from Chowchilla, California. They have a very 9 nice dairy farm there. 10 MR. COOK: Two or three generations? 11 MR. TRACE: Three. Three. He's mostly 12 building this for his children here. They'll be a great 13 addition to the State of Nevada. They're a great family. 14 And they make high quality milk for our Fallon plant, 15 where it's going, so. 16 MR. COOK: Well, like to see it. 17 MR. TRACE: Appreciate that. 18 MR. COOK: Like to see it. 19 So other than several good prospects, was there 20 anything else that was going on down there? 21 interesting developments or -- in terms of technological 22 advances or things that -- did you work it, by the way? 23 MS. VICKERY: No. 24 MR. COOK: You didn't get to go? 25 MS. VICKERY: No.

- 1 MR. COOK: You didn't get three days in Tulare, 2. California? Lovely Tulare, California? 3 MR. TRACE: It was foggy every morning. 4 MS. VICKERY: But the weather was nice. 5 Kathy's been there a few years, three years I think, and she froze to death, so I would have loved to go. 6 7 MS. EASLY: Cold. 8 MR. TRACE: I would say -- and I can't speak beyond this -- but drones was the big -- the big thing at 9 10 the farm show this year. And I didn't spend much time how
- 11 that's going to fit into ag, but they had -- you know, it
- 12 is in some fashion.
- 13 So, having said that, I can't get into leads
- 14 because I didn't really get into the leads with them, but
- there was a lot of exhibits featuring drones. And 15
- 16 actually had a separate break-out session one day speaking
- 17 to drones, so, you know.
- 18 MS. VICKERY: If you could just get them to
- 19 milk the cows for us.
- 20 MR. TRACE: Yeah, yeah.
- 21 MR. COLLIER: Maybe they'll herd off the
- 22 starlings.
- 23 MR. TRACE: Yeah.
- 24 MR. COOK: Hey, there you go. You may be onto
- 25 something.

MR. COLLIER: 1 Yeah. 2. MR. COOK: Starling chasers, huh? Anything else that anybody wants to 3 Okay. throw out on the table for discussion? 4 5 Seeing nothing, let's move ahead. 6 MR. HERNANDEZ: Last item on the agenda, 7 Mr. Chairman, is the public comments and discussion. 8 MR. COOK: Okay. Just kind of like we -- what we just had. But I guess we can wander off into other 9 10 topics not related to dairy if anybody really feels the 11 need. 12 Seeing none. 13 Anything down there? 14 MR. CROWTHER: Not does -- does not look like 15 We do have some public, but, nothing. anything. 16 MR. COOK: Okay. Anybody up here? Comments? 17 Observations? Input? Thoughts? 18 Mr. Reck? 19 MR. RECK: Gary with Model Dairy. 20 I just throw out there that if you were going 21 to do something to welcome that family into Smith Valley, 22 Model Dairy, we'd love to be part of it. You know, supply 23 product, help with a welcoming barbecue, something like 24 I know that might be outside of what we normally 25 do, but I think -- yeah, just locally here we'd love to --

MR. TRACE: 1 Sure. 2. MR. RECK: -- you know, support something like 3 that. 4 MR. TRACE: Okay. 5 MR. COOK: We appreciate that. That would be wonderful. 6 MR. COLLIER: 7 MR. COOK: We'll bring that to Lynn's attention 8 and put him to the task of --9 MR. RECK: There you go. 10 MR. COOK: -- using his creative abilities to 11 come up with something. 12 MR. TRACE: Perfect. 13 MR. COOK: So thank you. 14 Anything else? 15 MR. HERNANDEZ: I just want to say for the 16 record, the public members we have here are Dave Coon with 17 Anderson Dairy and Steve Weiland with Meadow Gold. 18 MR. COOK: Gentlemen, welcome. Wish we could 19 see you in the picture. 20 If there are no other comments or Okay. questions or observations from anybody present, then I 21 22 think what we'll do is go ahead and adjourn the meeting. 23 So thank you all for attending. 24 MR.
